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The Lure of a Temptation

Every one of the first three gospels provides an account of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. In some ways it mirrors the wanderings of Moses and the tribes of Israel in the Sinai desert. The forty years there becomes forty days in Jesus' temptations. In the case of Luke the temptations follow on from his baptism and come before the beginning of his public ministry in Galilee, his reading from the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue in his own home town, the calling of the first disciples and the sermon on the plain. The placement of the temptations in Luke is important. They show forth his integrity for the work that is to be carried out and his faithfulness to the purposes of God before he enters the public stage. There was no ICAC in first-century Palestine: a good temptation scene serves the equivalent of that purpose.

The German scholar Michael Welker has emphasized the role of the Spirit in Jesus' down-to-earth public ministry. The Spirit descended at his baptism and now, full of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit leads him into the wilderness. The temptation scene itself is crafted as a contest between the devil and Jesus. The biblical scholar, Walter Wink, has argued that we are all surrounded by impersonal powers and forces that tempt us, woos us, lead us into choices that are good and bad. Wink even suggests that congregations have their own angels and demons: he is not thinking of personalities, individuals habits. here. but suggestions and influences. On that basis we might well ask in this Lenten season of temptation and wilderness experiences, what are the angels and demons in our congregations? For a temptation to be worthy of being a temptation it needs to be attractive, alluring, enticing. There is no point in presenting a temptation or overcoming it if it is not worth resisting! The temptations offered to Jesus are timed for a moment of vulnerability: after forty days fasting he is famished. He is presented with the options of food (thus, physical sustenance at a time of great hunger), power and authority along the lines of how the 'world' normally thinks of those things, superman/spiderman/batman-like and a equivalent of divinity. It is a cleverly constructed dialogue: the devil poses his questions in the form of a hypothetical, a maybe, a possibility.... ifJesus responds in a

more active voice: 'It is written'.

Just as Peter will later deny Jesus three times, and Pilate will say three times that he finds no reason for Jesus to be put to death, so the devil tempts Jesus three times. For the moment the devil retreats but the contest is not over: the devil remains waiting for 'an opportune moment'. On the cross it is not the devil who poses the questions 'if you are the king of the Jews, save yourself'. The temptations at the last come through 'the leaders', the soldiers and one of the criminals.

'Signs of the Times'.

One of the key ideas in Luke is the capacity to discern the signs of the times (Luke 12:54 -56). This week we have before us the war on Ukraine and extreme weather events. Around the world Christian leaders have been calling for peace and a ceasefire. Reach out your hand, O God, that makes in those who fear to sink new Peters – finding themselves lifted to help a neighbour, to share food, seek shelter, care for COVID protocols. And bless, O Holy One, the ministry of disaster recovery chaplain in the days of rain to come and the task of recovery Amen.

Being prepared for next week's worship:

Lent 2 Philippians 3:17-4:1; Luke 13:31-35. Theme: Citizenship

This Lenten season invites us to consider the nature of citizenship. In our day and age citizenship has become an important factor in determining rights and responsibilities; some of us may have dual citizenships through the act of migration. Others are denied citizenship, residency, refugee or asylum-seeker status. In the Christian faith there are two traditions of citizenship – the earthly and the heavenly. This distinction has sometimes been described as the teaching of the 'two kingdoms' – the earthly city and the city of God. What Paul is seeking to remind the Philippians is how, though they live in a Roman colony, they have another citizenship which binds them to 'the cross of Christ'. The implicit tension between these two citizenships / 'cities' is further evident in the reading taken from Luke. The name Jerusalem actually means 'city of peace' - and yet Jesus laments its record: it is the 'city' (the power) that kills the prophets. It is at odds with this other citizenship. For us this theme of two citizenships raises a potential point of tension: what happens when your being a citizen in Christ is at odds with your being a citizen of Australia?
