In those first few centuries there was a lot of work to do. It was during this time that the liturgical patterns of worship were put into place;

Coming Soon

Over the next few months I would like to offer a number of events and workshops that might help deepen our grasp of the faith. Those being considered have to do with:



On liturgy: Have you considered helping lead worship? Have you never been asked? Or, if you have been asked, were vou a bit uncertain as to

how you might manage? This workshop will be a one-off (a couple of hours at most). It will be designed to explain why worship takes the shape it does, what is the role of music, and make suggestions as to how you can write your own prayers for worship (rather than going on-line).

'Who do you say that I am?' This question put by Jesus to the disciples has been described as a 'continuing interrogation'. How we answer may change from one period of our life to the next. The purpose of this study (over three weeks) will be to consider how we answer that question for our individual selves; we will then seek to consider how we might negotiate a common congregational understanding (you can still have your own personal response, but it will now be placed within the fold of the congregation as a whole)

Finally we will note that Jesus prefaced that core question with another, 'who do people say that I am?' We will set out to explore how our understanding of Jesus addresses life in our neighbourhood.

'Believing'. In days gone by there used to be confirmation classes where people might be given instruction on the core beliefs of the Christian faith. We will come at this a little differently. It will be a chance to chat about what Christians believe and what they find difficult - or hard to believe. We will do this for a couple for weeks.

ing story of how the Bible came into being, how it was translated into vernacular languages (like English) and at what cost, and why have we got so many different versions. Presbytery News

The Parramatta-Nepean Presbytery had its first face to face meeting in sometime at the Grantham Heights Uniting Church. The turnout was not huge but it was better than meeting on zoom.

The highlight of the meeting was the presentation done by the Revd. Christine Palmer on her work in south-west Sydney. Christine is serving as a 'community minister' rather than in a conventional placement. There is no church building here; there was no congregation.



Christine has been given the task of developing something new in a way that is inclusive of the local neighourhood. The program is called suburban seeds and you can check out the website to see the interesting and proactive things she has set out to do. The website address is: https://

www.suburbanseeds.org Christine is the first to say what is happening here is in certain respects more aspirational than fully realized. The overall intention is to be 'growing life-giving communities that connect people, faith and life'. Christine's vision flows from the call 'to love one's neighbour as oneself'.

What this has meant so far is the setting up of a play in the park group, occasional services in the park, a mentoring program for vulnerable children (in association with Campbelltown Uniting Church) on the basis of 'one child, one mentor, one hour per week) – and participation in the Yellow Hampers Project. Under the umbrella of this project donations of food are collected and delivered to those in need.

Synod News



One of the conference rooms at the Penrith Panthers club was jampacked with people for the Pasifika-led climate electoral forum. For some time now the Uniting Church has been to the forefront of showing concern for low-lying islands facing sea-level rise. This event was a chance for members of Pasifika congregations (as well as others within our presbytery) to tell some stories and sing some songs – and then ask questions of the political candidates who had been invited. It so turned out that only Chris Bowen, the shadow minister for climate and energy turned up. An empty chair was left to indicate those who had gone 'missing in action' according to the Samoan minister at Lidcombe. The Moderator-Elect, Rev. Mata Hiliau Havea reflected on Paul's image of 'one body' and how if one member suffers, we all do. Several young people spoke about visits to their island country of origins and how, over a period of time, it is far too easy to see the impact of sea-level rise as land, plantation and houses disappear – washed away.

Maina Talia from Tuvalu did not speak at this gathering but he was in attendance. He is currently doing his PhD on the theme of 'Am I Not Your Neighbour?'. Maina has been the co-chair of the NN based Global Indigenous Forum on Climate Change; he has addressed the German parliament (at their invitation) and has attended every COP conference since Paris 2015. He would like there to have been a question about the legal provision for climate displaced persons (refugees) once islands become uninhabitable.
