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Crossing Cultures

An yeong ha seyo, bula vinaka,

In his sequel to the gospel Luke provides for 'dear Theophilus' an account of the spread of the gospel from the Ascension of Jesus through to Paul's arrival in Rome and his living there for two years. It is not a history of the very earliest days of the church as we would know and 'do' history today. We are inclined to ask a lot more questions. The way it is told nevertheless, gives us a window on how the infant church became inclusive of a diversity of cultures rather than being a minority sect within Judaism.

Our reading this week is likely to seem a little strange. Imagine a church council meeting where the chair is asked 'why did he go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?'. And, then, in response to this question, s/he replies how s/he had been in a trance and beheld a number of different kind of animals that s/he was told to kill. S/he hesitates because they are unclean animals and these dietary laws separate him/her, as a Jew, from the Gentiles. The narrative continues and it ends up with him/her sharing a meal and the gospel with a household of those who are uncircumcised and who eat unclean food.

Our church council meetings are nothing like this one in Jerusalem. It may seem odd to us but the issues at stake in Peter's report are far more far-reaching than would be found in any report to presbytery, synod or assembly. It is revolutionary. It represents a fresh understanding of how God is present and at work in the midst of those who are in a covenantal relationship.

We often interpret the Easter events in a way that is rather personal for us and how 'I' am reconciled to God, set free, made whole etc. It is a response that often leads to a lot of statements (and songs / hymns) that feature our individual selves. And there is a place for that – but that is not what is going on here. The Christian faith could have remained a in-house affair made up of people from very similar cultural backgrounds to one another. If there was anyone who came from outside the usual group, then, they would have to assimilate into the existing pattern which meant circumcision and observing particular dietary

laws. This concern for what food you ate had nothing to do waistlines! It had to do with holiness codes and how you preserved the purity of your faith.

The report that Peter makes to the church in Jerusalem overturns these expectations. The Gentiles (with all their different customs, other languages) are to be included in the body of Christ – the church – without any of these constraints or hoops to jump. Peter's report effectively justifies Paul's work as 'the apostle to the Gentiles': it is no wonder that in recent times Paul has been described as the apostle of multiculturalism.

On three separate occasions now (1985, 2006 and 2012) the Uniting Church has made statements about cultural diversity and linguistic difference. It has recognized that the Uniting Church has moved beyond the mere coming together of three different denominations - the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregationalist. In some parts of our presbytery the cultural diversity is more obvious than in the church in Baulkham Hills. In some of those other parts of the presbytery (and the synod) a lot of work has needed to be done to fashion the worship and witness of the church so that it reflects the cultural diversity within the church and the neighbourhood.

In its statements the Uniting Church has declared this diversity to be 'a gift of God'; it has regarded this coming together of cultures as a 'foretaste of the kingdom of God' and a 'sign of witness and hope' to the wider Australian society. There is still a lot of work to be done in order to release the full potential of these claims and ensure that, through the Holy Spirit, the hope expressed back in 1985 that this inclusion of many cultures would enrich the life of the church as a whole.

On receiving a 'vision'

15 May 2022 Sunday: 8am, 9:30am and 6:45pm.

Bible Readings:

Acts 16:9-15

John 14:23-29

It seems as if visions play an important part in the spread of the gospel. They hold out a hope that break with expectations and past habits. They can lead us into fresh territories and experiences that lie beyond our comfort zones. And, unlike our contemporary talk of mission statements and profiles, they come not from but from without, from beyond us. That being the case one can well understand the summons in John's gospel not to be afraid. The promise of the Spirit's coming is made but that does not necessarily do away fears with any and apprehensions we might have regards to what is expected of us.

Imagine then setting out to serve the gospel in a new land where you do not know what to expect. The significance of this Paul vision for is Macedonian in his vision is asking him to set foot in what we now know as Europe. Philippi was a Roman colony in the north-eats of modern Greece. Today it is a World Heritage Site but then it was a major city that had expanded through the bestowal of lands on veterans of the Roman army. Not long before they had won an important battle nearby. The first church in Europe comes into being in the home of Lydia. Being a seller of purple means that she is a wealthy woman: it was difficult and an expensive process to colour cloth purple in those times. She herself is from Thyatira which was not far from (back in north-west Troy Turkey, not far from Gallipoli). Lydia is what we might call today an expatriate. church that meets in her home Paul's later receive warmest and most intimate letter. That may well be the case, though Paul's first visit to Philippi is not without problems. The narrative then tells of how the owners of a slave girl make a formal complaint against him: he is bringing customs into the city that are unlawful for Roman citizens to observe. Paul and Silas are imprisoned. It seems as if thes visions that come from without stretch us and can place us in positions of risk that more well-managed plans may not.

Penrith Uniting Church Hub Young Adult Worker 2.5-3 days per week Commencing as soon as possible

Penrith Uniting Church Hub is a development of the Uniting Church congregations and groups within the Penrith LGA in Western Sydney. We minister to people from many cultural and language backgrounds in places with varying levels of disadvantage. We also connect with the Kingswood Campus of Western Sydney University.

We are looking for a person to come and grow the collection of younger adults in the region. through developing connection, discipleship, and leadership. Our hope is that as this group grows and strengthens together, this ministry will extend into the local community, including into the University campus.

We are seeking someone who can hit the ground running in developing this ground-breaking ministry with younger adults, especially from multi-cultural backgrounds. The successful applicant will work with the support of the Team leader and a growing ministry team which is beginning to be put in place. There is also support from PULSE from the Synod. The position is funded for 2 years, and we intend to develop it to continue after that time.

Applicants must hold a valid Working with Children Check Clearance from the NSW Office of the Children's Guardian before applying for this position.

It is preferable that the Applicant will have a good knowledge of the Uniting Church and have completed Ethical Ministry Foundational training and Safe Church Awareness Training (or be prepared to do so).
