The Anniversary of the Uniting Church

It is now 45 years ago since the Uniting Church came into existence. Within the grand sweep of Christian history that is not long. The particular denominations that went into its making – the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational go back several centuries further but that it still a relatively short period of time in the 2000 years of the Christian tradition. It means that we come at today's texts from within a reformed and evangelical heritage and do so in the contemporary context of Australia.

In the gospel passage for today Jesus sets out on the journey towards Jerusalem; that journey will take place over ten chapters which is a sizeable chunk of Luke's gospel. Up until now Jesus spent most of his time in Galilee. Now he travels south: 'he sets his face to go to Jerusalem'. The time is drawing near for him to be 'taken up' – on the cross? His ascension?; there is a sense of imminent completion pending. He makes his way to Jerusalem through the territory of the Samaritans. They are not received well, though elsewhere in Luke, the Samaritans provide the one who helps the man in distress (the good Samaritan)—hence the example of what it means to be a neighbour—and the only leper who is healed and comes back to thank Jesus. The cost of discipleship is then made known through three sayings to do with the Son of man having nowhere to lay his head, let the dead bury the dead and the one who takes his hand from the plough is not for the kingdom.

That last reference is rather timely. We may not live in first century Palestine; so far as I am aware there is no place name in New South Wales that resembles the postcode 'Samaria'. And very few of us will have had much experience of the plough. But maybe this saying has an ongoing currency that endures well beyond its original context.

The cultural hold or grasp that faith has exercised over generations of Christians is not what it once was. We live in a time of an increasing number of 'nones' – that is, people who say that they have no faith of any kind. At the last census Crows Nest had one of the highest proportions of such people in the country. On my way to the office this morning I found myself listening to 95.3 FM Smooth: the first song up was Michael Stipe and R.E.M singing 'Losing my religion'. It really is a song of unrequited love, a love song, but the title echoes through so much current experience. We might say it 'speaks'.

For us in the Uniting Church this now not uncommon practice of taking one's hand off the plough is very challenging. There are many reasons why this happens - and COVID hasn't helped. Over a long period of time now we have become much more used to what 'the self' likes / does not like – and sometimes the life of faith, the practice of being the church reflects that. One philosopher has even written a book on this theme taking advantage of that

Australian invention 'the selfie': that is the title.

The gospel of Luke bears witness to something a bit different. It describes the kingdom of God through lenses of love of neighbour, healing, reconciliation and a Christ who forgives those who do not know what they do. It is a rather an appealing account of life together, but it comes with a cost. The apostle Paul discovered that the Galatians were only too keen to return to old ways and forget their freedom in Christ: they were in the throes of taking their hand off the plough. He reminds them of their baptism into Christ and proceeds to write to them about the fruits of the Spirit. Those fruits amount to a list of virtues that the Christian is called to let grow and upon which a civil society depends.

The foundational document of the Uniting Church, *The Basis of Union*, makes no reference to Samaria, ploughs or R.E.M. It does speak about the risk of 'losing the way' and reminds us that the Uniting Church is 'renewed' in and through Christ's 'own strange way'. Perhaps that passage from Galatians is worth pondering upon: the times may be tough. Some may have let go of their faith (and, in some cases, perhaps with good reason) – and yet, in spite of, nevertheless, these fruits of the spirit remain worthy of cultivating. In tough and difficult times it is good to encounter kindness, gentleness, patience and the like.

The Uniting Church came into being in 1977. Its existence is a fruit of the ecumenical spirit. Its formation was reckoned to be a sign of hope and joy. It was imagined at the time that the Uniting Church would become a 'movement' rather than just another denomination. Its very name 'uniting' rather than 'united' captured that hope. It was recognized in its *Basis of Union* that, through time, the church must respond to fresh challenges; the Uniting Church professed its belief that 'in his own strange way Christ constitutes, rules and renews [the disciples] as his Church'.

Sometimes the church – the whole church – goes through a season of setback. The *Basis* actually refers to how we can run the risk of 'losing the way'. Our reading from the gospel of Luke reminds us that the journey of faith is an adventure that can cut across our default modes of

security and certainty: the we are called to follow did not have an election manifesto of promises and tax cuts. He reminds those who seek to follow that 'foxes have holes, the birds of the air have nests but the son of man has nowhere to lay his head'. There is an open-endedness about a future that is breaking in upon those who set out.

In the midst of the current difficulties facing the Uniting Church we can recall that Christ has set us free; that we are called to love our neighbour as oneself. In demanding times the fruits of the Spirit that Paul speaks of in his epistle to the Galatians are priceless. What might it mean for a church to embody and witness to its neighbours a life in the Spirit that is marked by 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control'.
