# Signs of the Times

The practice of a public theology is designed to read the signs of the times. It does so in order to explore how we understand the Christian faith as it seeks to express itself in society in general. Under the umbrella of a public theology faith takes seriously what is happening in our world and expresses a desire to contribute to the well-being of society, the common good, and a civil society. It recognizes that in a multifaith / secular society it is one voice among many and cannot lay claim to having a privileged position and impose its point of view on others. It seeks to persuade – to be like salt and leaven to use a couple of images taken from Jesus' teaching in the synoptic (the first three) gospels.

Our daily lives are currently being lived out against a background of many global crises or points of concern. There is quite a line-up: weather/the climate/the floods; the war in the Ukraine and its impact on prices and the cost of living; and, then there is still COVID. The moment you have one booster it seems as if another variant is on the way.

Perhaps one can create a space, a time for quite reflection to the two songs below. They both come with a back story.

The first is 'It is well with my soul'. The words are by Horatio Spafford after a series of traumatic events: the sequence began with the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 which ruined him financially. It coincided with the death of his four year old son. Then, a couple of years later, his wife and four daughters were crossing the Atlantic when it was hit by another vessel. Only his wife survived – 'saved alone'—by a fisherman who spotted her lying in the water. Soon afterwards, Spafford set sail to join his wife and he composed these words as his ship passed nearby where his daughters had lost their lives. The tune was composed by Philip Bliss and named after the ship his daughters had been on—Ville du Havre.

It has been a song that has spoken to many through confusing times.

It is well with my soul:

The second is by a young composer from across the Tasman—Malcolm Gordon. 'Christ before me' began its life as a poem as a paraphrase from lines taken from St Patrick's Breastplate. He wrote the words out at regular intervals as a spiritual practice. On a plane trip from Frankfurt he was carrying on this practice and had just written 'Christ behind me' when a cantankerous elderly gentleman began thumping Malcolm's seat. Rather than call the steward for assistance he wondered about how Christ might be behind him in and through 'this old codger' and 'his unpleasant exterior'.

# On Being the Church

Over the last several weeks we have been exploring what might be our understanding of the gospel. The second study in the set of three workshops focused on what kind of gospel do we think the life of St. Matthew's proclaims in word and deed. We thought about which texts from the gospels might best illustrate that understanding and practice. In pursuit of this aim we thought about how we understand what is the church: there is a distinction to be made here between 'what the church happens to be' and 'what the church ought to be'. There is always a gap between an all-too-human institution and a gathering of flawed people—on the one hand—and what God expects the church to be—the body of Christ.

There is also a distinction between the church and how it participates in the mission of God. The church has no mission. It is God's mission. We participate in that mission in order to bear witness to the kingdom of God.

We also spent some time thinking about different models of the church; we wondered how we might rank them in order beginning with what we think best reflects St. Matthew's to what least does. Once the choice is made, then the question arises: is that the best fit for the present time? Do we need to make some shifts in emphases? And, if so, how do we do that? It is a familiar story.

The six models are:

- institutional
- sacramental
- preaching / proclamation
- fellowship of the Spirit
- diaconal / advocacy / social justice
- making disciples

# Coming Up

How on earth did we get the Bible? Is there an original copy anywhere? Who translated it into English? Why have we got so many versions? What difference did new technology (the printing press) make?

The forming of the Bible took time: decisions had to be made. Should the gospel of John be in—or out? Translating the Bible in vernacular languages like English was high risk. You might need to flee the country—or, after burial, your body might be exhumed, burned and your ashes thrown into a river. It sounds like an episode out of the children's series, 'Horrible Histories'.

The next series of studies/workshop will be on how we got the Bible and what might be some tools for interpreting its meaning

# **Coffee & Discovery Musical Concert**



# The Lord's Prayer

Over the years, there have been a number of different versions of the Lord's Prayer set to music. One, called the Millenium Prayer was set to the music of Auld Lang Syne and recorded by Cliff Richard. Another well-known version was recorded by Sister Janet Meade in 1973. Indisputably the most well-known version was written by the American Christian Albert Hay Malotte in 1935. There are a number of stories about Malotte's motivation for writing the song, some of which are highly dubious. However, before writing the song. Malotte told a friend that he had the conviction to do it because "I feel so close to God". When asked later why he set The Lord's Prayer to music he replied "You can't answer a question like that intelligently - it came from within".

First published as a vocal solo for Malotte's close friend John Charles Thomas, the music has arguably become one of the best-known religious songs of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

More than two dozen arrangements have appeared in hymnals since 1976.

Many artists have recorded it, ranging from concert and operatic stars to popular singers. country and gospel singers and instrumentalists. Some of the artists who have recorded this version include Mario Lanza, Andrea Boccelli, Charlotte Church and Susan Boyle. It has been sung at events of national and international significance, including the 2001 Service of National Prayer and Remembrance at Washington National Cathedral following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 and Billy Graham Crusades around the world. As well as solo versions of the song, there have been choral arrangements, instrumental, ensemble and orchestral settings. It is clear from the number of recordings and editions available that Malotte's work can be performed with great leeway in interpretation, including the highly rhythmic versions from the Caribbean and Latin America.

This morning we will be listening to Susan Boyle's recording of Malotte's *The Lord's Prayer*.

# The Role of Synod COO

No, this isn't a role in the Synod that's reason for existence is to record the calls of a Morning Dove. It is the Chief Operating Officer, COO, role that I believe I was called to fulfil as part of my walk with our Lord Jesus Christ.

The church is an interesting organisation to work for, as a church we are called to three core activities worship, witness and service, word and deed (for those who like two word descriptions), and within the Synod we need to keep our ministry balanced in all three areas because it's very easy to allow service to takeover worship and witness. As a church, we are viewed as a basic religious charity, a for purpose non-government organisation operating a charitable business, but strive to operate as though we are not a business but a church. Within the workplace there is a very diverse group of people with approximately 1/3 being ordained ministers and the other 2/3 lay staff, giving us a workplace where some people are following a calling to ministry for their whole life, others fulfilling their Christian calling for a season exercising their various gifts and talents, and others who get joy from working in an organisation that makes a positive impact on community and the lives of vulnerable people.

Being in the Synod Office is a different space to that of a state corporate office or the head office of an organisation, because our role is to support presbyteries and encourage congregations, that often means we are working hand in hand with the presbyteries to support congregations like ours in the ministries we deliver to the faithful and the wider community - worship, witness and service.

The area of the Synod that I lead is called Synod Operations, which is code for if it is not ministers, education or mission related one of my team will most probably be the person able to support you, but then the lines are blurry. For instance, anything to do with property, insurance, legal, work health & safety, HR, Payroll, IT, governance, risk, compliance, project, records, fleet, facilities, procurement, property trust, church institutions, governance and constitutions, etc.. We also manage key relationships with government regulators and external agencies.

This means that we get involved in the best of the best, the worst of the worst, and everything in between, and interact with people when they are at their best and worst. Examples of the range of activities I get involved with or lead include supporting set-up of new ministries and missions,

leading a review of parish mission governance and structures, supporting congregations or church entities who are having financial challenges and helping them work their way back to health, supporting the UAICC Ministry Centres ensuring they have the resources they require, leading incorporation of five of our schools, developing the Future Directions Resourcing Framework, balancing the Synod Office budget, etc..

My role incorporates being the Synod Property Officer and a Member of the NSW and the ACT Property Trusts. Both of these roles come with a number of specific responsibilities either in the Act of Parliament that created the Church or the Regulations.

My days vary dramatically. They can include and vary from:

- celebrating the hope we provide year 9—12 students and their families at Margaret Jurd College while attending their mid-year celebration to discussing future options for burial and internment while representing the church at a stakeholder forum with the Catholic Cemeteries and Crematoria,
- overseeing and shaping major, multi-million dollar, property developments to approving small property work in congregations,
- reviewing and endorsing congregation grant applications to government funders for as low as \$5k to reviewing and recommending or being part of the approval committee for \$100m proposals,
- conversation and providing supporting congregation church council leaders solve local issues to negotiating deals with global CEO's of major consulting businesses or senior legal counsel, and
- leading congregational worship to presenting proposals at Presbytery, Synod Standing Committee or Synod meetings.

Personally, I feel blessed to be able to utilise the gifts, talents and life experiences to be a servant leader within the wider church, however, recognising that all roles are only for a season so whilst the Spirit is leading I'm following as quickly as I can and seeking to provide through my team a safe place for the staff and a capability to support congregations and presbyteries etc. pursue their ministry and mission visions.


