Sign of the Times

In our reading taken from Luke this morning Jesus gives a weather report. It is rather different from what you get on television these days. We live in an age where weather report has become professional with its own science—and indeed social commentators would say it has become 'commodified'. What they mean by that has to do with how the weather can serve economic interests. None of that existed back in biblical times: the weather was different! It was sometimes reckoned that the weather was God's gift—an element of creation. It could also be the stage upon which a moral barometer was set. Bad weather might be a sign of God's disapproval, good, growing weather might be seen as a sign of God's providence—in other words, how it produced the necessary goods for our survival.

In his address to the gathered crowds Jesus plays upon how the local people would know how to read the weather: in first century Palestine if the wind was coming from the west, then there was a chance of a build up of clouds and rain. If the wind was from the south, then they would know the weather was likely to be extremely hot. The reference to the wind is itself interesting as in Hebrew the word for wind is the same as the word for spirit and breath.

Jesus uses this weather image for a particular reason. It is almost like the equivalent of a parable for it is concerned how we discern the breaking in of the kingdom. For this purpose he makes use of a special word for time. In the Greek language there are two words for time. *Chronos* has to do with the time of the day, a diary, a watch, what's the time. This word gives us the English word chronology. The other word is *kairos*. It means the 'right time', the opportune time, God's time. Kairos time breaks in upon chronos time. This other sense of time is present throughout Luke—for instance, when Zacchaeus is told 'today, salvation has come to this house'. This word kairos has its origins in archery and has to do with shooting for the bullseye! It passed into rhetoric where in the rough and tumble of debate, you lookl for the right time to insert your key point.

Sometimes in this passage in Luke the *kairos* moment can refer to the 'signs of the times'. We are able to see what is going on around us and we begin to interpret. Jesus asks a different question: in the midst of these signs of the times, can you discern the breaking in of the kingdom of God?

A Little History: Constantine

One of the most important times in the life of the church has to do with the Emperor Constantine; he was Emperor between 306 and 337. Most of his life he lived as a pagan; following a dream before a battle in which Christ appeared to him he began to favour the Christian faith. Up until this time the Christian faith was a minority religion, subject to periodic outbursts of persecution, the subject of scoffing and mockery from the best educated. It was a faith on the margins and attracted much caricature. Constantine bestowed tolerance on the Christian faith through the Edict of Milan (311) and made the Christian faith the religion of the empire.

So much was now open to change: churches were built; Constantine's mother was the first to initiate the practice of pilgrimages to the Holy Land. Constantine would oversee the council of the church that would produce the Nicene Creed and the move towards formalizing the New Testament took a step forward.

Constantine would in due course become the first emperor to convert to the Christian faith He did so on his death bed. He founded the city that came to bear his name Constantinople (now Istanbul) was named after him. Eusebius , the first 'historian' of the church, reckoned that Constantine was the 13th apostle.

"The Sabbath"

Jeremiah 1: 4-10 Luke 13: 10-17


One of the key religious and cultural issues of the Jewish nation in the time of Jesus was the observance of the Sabbath. There were a number of things you could not do. It was a day to keep holy and refrain from work (and no doubt Sabbath sports, had such things existed back then). The call to keep the Sabbath is the least popular of all the ten commandments that Moses received on Mount Sinai. Of all the denominations in Australia we rank fairly near the bottom here-which is rather strange and probably needs to be reviewed. It isn't just a case of what we do on Sundays (our sabbath). The Sabbath lies at the midway between those commands to do with God and those to do with our fellow human beings. It is the link between the two. The Sabbath is also the crown of creation; today it carries care of creation themes along with ones to do with justice. In the reading for today the leader of the synagogue has a much reduced understanding of the Sabbath. He takes exception to Jesus healing a crippled woman on the Sabbath because (in his opinion) it counts as work.

The Jeremiah reading has to do with the calling of the prophet. No one sets themselves up to be a prophet. 'The word of the Lord' takes the initiative. The tendency is for unlikely figures to be called to this office. Jeremiah is hesitant because he does not know how to speak and he is only a boy. His complaint would matter if indeed it was he who had to think up what to say in order to fulfil this prophetic role. It is not his agenda, though. On occasion he will act out his message as well as delivering 'the word of the Lord'.

Here is a question for your reflection. What do you think are the marks of a prophetic faith?



Roofing Update
