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Keeping the Sabbath

It can be rather interesting to set the reading for the day inside the big picture that the gospel is seeking to tell. Right back near the beginning of the year we heard of how Luke set the agenda for Jesus ministry through a reading based on Isaiah: 'the spirit of the Lord is upon me'. It declares how the oppressed will be set free. In a manner of speaking the healing of this woman who has been crippled for 18 years is a story of being 'set free'—as Jesus' response to the leader of the synagogue.

The 'problem' is that Jesus heals on the Sabbath. In the course of his ministry how Jesus and his disciples observed the Sabbath is full of controversy. The conflict might be seen as a clash between law and grace. With the coming of Jesus the church did not do away with thinking on the Sabbath, though. The day was changed from Saturday to Sunday and became synonymous with the day of resurrection and the prospect of new life. It became the day set aside for worship. Over time it would become associated with Sabbatarianism and a day of restrictions. That all changed with the advent of Sunday sport and Sunday shopping. For members of the Uniting Church the research shows that of all the ten commandments the keeping of the Sabbath is the least popular of all the commandments.

All of which is to miss the point about the importance of the Sabbath. This biblical idea is making a stunning comeback in the world of biblical and theological studies. The Sabbath's importance in the line-up of the commandments cannot be ignored: those that come before all have to do with the worship and reverence for God; that come after have to do with our human interactions. The Sabbath holds the two together. It is like the buckle in the belt. But more than that, the Sabbath is linked to the completion of creation as well as the observance of the year of jubilee when debts were forgiven and the land rested. The Sabbath has become an important key to how we care for God's creation. Going back to Luke's agenda setting reading from Isaiah, the Sabbath in this sense is linked to the acceptable year of the Lord.

A Moment in Time: The Nicene Creed

Becoming a tolerated religion in the Roman Empire (313) marked a significant change in the Christian faith. It was not just a case that the threat of persecution lessened-though it would reappear now and then. The Christian faith was more likely to attract those who might not have previously considered this strange sect. The spread of faith also meant that there were more differences to encounter: how was difference to be 'managed'? In the earliest days of the church there had been a 'Rule of Faith' and the Apostles' Creed. Now that Constantine was Emperor there was need to respond to the dilemma of what is the relationship between the Father and the Son. Constantine called together an assembly of bishops which met in Nicea (to the east of Constantinople/Istanbul). They formulated the Nicene Creed. It was designed to preserve the divine nature of Christ (being of the same essence as the Father) alongside his humanity. Several decades (381) later the dilemma arose as to two to understand the relationship of the Spirit to the Father and the Son

There were 'losers' in these Councils. Their understandings would come to be known as 'heresies', from a Greek word meaning 'a choice'. In this case the heresy would be known as Arianism after Arius who considered Jesus to be 'the oldest and not beloved creature of God' but not equal to God.

Because the Christian faith was now the official religion this controversy had threated to destabilize the Empire.

28 August 2022 Sunday: 8am, 9:30am & 6:45pm Bible Readings:

Jeremiah 2: 4-13 Luke 14: 1, 7-14 Once again it is the Sabbath. How Jesus stands in relation to the Sabbath is a subject for close scrutiny. On this occasion Jesus has been invited to a meal in the home of a leader of the Pharisees. The ancient world was organized along codes of honour and shame. It mattered where you sat around the table. The text says that Jesus when he saw the guests trvina to work out for themselves the best and most honourable seats at the table, he tells a parable. Strictly speaking what follows is not a parable. It is more like an example of direct teaching. Its purpose is to emphasize the virtue of humility. In the ancient world humility was not ranked highly: it is a distinctively Christian virtue that goes back to the example and teaching of Jesus himself.

Jeremiah has already received two 'words' of the Lord preparing him for his prophetic vocation. He has been informed that the Lord has made him into 'a fortified city, an iron pillar, and a bronze wall against the whole land, against the kings of Judah, its officials, its priests, and the people of the land.' They will fight against him. The leaders of the people of Israel are in exile in Babylon. The book is designed to explain how this misfortune came about through the way in which their worship has become corrupted.

Now he delivers his first oracle to the 'house of Jacob'. Through Jeremiah the Lord reminds the people of how God had led them out of Egypt into the promised land; rather than ask 'where is the Lord' (twice that question is raised) they have forgotten that past and gone after false gods.
