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# Gratitude / 'To the glory of God'.

#### 2 Timothy 2:8-15 Luke 17:11-19

**O**ne might have imagined that Paul had every reason to be bitter. He is writing to his 'beloved child' in the faith—Timothy while he is 'chained like a criminal'. The apostle has undergone many hardships for the sake of his life in Christ. In the midst of his setback and suffering he discerns purpose: he advises Timothy to be an 'approved worker' and not to be ashamed of the message he is to proclaim.

The way in which Paul repeatedly calls upon the followers of Christ not to be ashamed of the gospel should be seen in the light of first responses to the claims of this 'new' faith. It was a stumbling block for Jews, a scandal—and a folly, a madness for Greeks. Some of the more sophisticated of pagans in the classical world thought that members of the church were 'cannibals' because the ate the body of Christ and drank his blood; it was rather easy to misrepresent the 'truth' Timothy is commended to death: was the crucifixion a sign of how Christians preached infanticide?

**P**aul writes as he does because he has experienced grace; his letters are full of thankfulness. That should be expected as a matter of custom. The standard practice of a Greek letter was to give thanks after acknowledging who you were and to whom you were writing. Except – Paul transforms the sense of gratitude because his thankfulness is always bound up with how those in Christ nurture the life of the gospel. There is gratitude for the life of faith.

This theme of gratitude is also present in the Luke reading. In this gospel those from other cultures play a significant role—none more so than the despised Samaritans. In this account Jesus and his disciples are *en route* to Jerusalem; they through Galilee where pass they encounter ten men with skin diseasespresumably lepers. They are healed: Jesus tells them to 'show' themselves to the priests—hence, all but one must have been Jews as this was stock response to healing. They had asked for mercy from Jesus; they recognize that he has a power to heal but only one-the Samaritanreturns to say `thank' Jesus.

The Samaritan would not have been able to go to the priest or enter the Temple.

This Samaritan leper is the only one in all of the gospels who thanks Jesus. In response Jesus alters the verb from 'thanks' to one of 'giving glory to God'.

This account of the Samaritan leper stands alongside the parable of the good Samaritan. The one who gives thanks like the one who helps the victim on the side of the road is the one who is not expected to do so. It illustrates how the gospel of Luke reaches out into the Gentile world and embraces the one who is 'other'. According to the gospel of John (4:9) 'Judeans have no dealings with Samaritans'.



# Pentecost 19 "The heart of Faith"

Sunday 16 October: 8am, 9:30am & 6:45pm

Bible Readings: Jeremiah 31: 27-34 Luke 18: 1-8

The power of this parable to do with not losing heart depends upon some reversal expectations. It is usual think of a judge been an upholder of the judicial system and carrying out his responsibilities with integrity, That is not the case here: he is described as 'unjust' and as having 'no fear of God and no respect for anyone'. There were two classes of cases that would come before the courts criminal and civil. The latter would have to do with matters of property, money, everyday litigation. There would have been a court of three judges. The more serious cases, the criminal, would be held before the Sanhedrin Council.

of The other reversal expectation concerns the widow. In the ancient world widow had were few rights and very vulnerable. Luke explains that the purpose of the parable is to encourage prayer and not lose heart. It presumes as such the capacity to forget prayer and lose hope. The widow persists; at face value the odds against her. It is not as if she has initiated a complaint against

someone else; her vulnerability lies in how someone has accused her (of what we do not know). She is not in a position not to respond.

There is a sense where 'we' are the widow. The unjust judge is contrasted with a God who is just. The parable does not seek to supply the details of a court case or establish an expression of legal precedence. It is speaking into the character and one of those distinguishing attributes is justice.

Of all the prophetic books where there could have been a loss of heart, Jeremiah stands out. It is book full of lamentation; а Yahweh will not relent; and Jeremiah's eves are like fountains of tears. In the midst of this grim turmoil comes the home of a new beginning—'the days are surely coming'. The promise of a new covenant written on the heart will be realized and the people will know that 'I will be their God and they shall be my people'.

## Update from the Joint Nominations Committee (JNC)

St. Matthews' JNC is made up of two Presbytery appointed representatives (Grant Atkins from Quakers Hill Uniting and Carmel leraci from Wesley Castle Hill), together with six congregational representatives – Alexander Lawless, Dean Drayton, Eulalie Herat, Helen Olley, Karen Vandenberg and Mike Underwood. The role of the Committee is to find a new minister for our Congregations.

On 20<sup>th</sup> September, the NSW Synod ACOMP Placements Committee approved our Church profile and provided approval to fill our vacant Ministerial position. The next step in the process is for the ACOMP Placements Committee to propose names of appropriate ministers, who shall be invited to a conversation with the JNC.

Unfortunately, the Placements Committee were not able to provide any names to the JNC at this time. We are hopeful that they will soon have some suggestions for the JNC to consider.

In the meantime, the JNC request your prayerful support of this process. Please continue to pray that God will lead the right person to minister with us at St. Matthew's.
