The good, the bad and the ugly

Isaiah 65:17-25 Luke 21: 5-19

These two readings represent endings of sorts. They are set down for the last week in the season of Pentecost and the second last week of this liturgical year. This year we read them in the midst of so much uncertainty – from the war in Ukraine, the conference on climate change in Egypt, the mid-term elections in the United States and inflation.

The Isaiah reading comes from a section named Trito- (or Third) Isaiah. This prophetic book is presented to us as one, but it actually covers three very different time zones. The people of Israel have now returned from exile. The Persians have defeated the Babylonians. It is a time of restoration and a new creation. The captivity of the past has come to an end. What is to unfold is not without controversy: how should those who have returned relate to those who remained in Israel? What happens to the land which is now owned by those who remained but belonged to the families of those taken into exile? Who should govern and how? The oracle speaks of new heavens and a new earth. It is to be a time of joy and rejoicing. The distress of the past has now passed. The vision is one of a utopian fertility and the well-being of peoples. It is like a new start. It is a vision that will require great care to negotiate.

One of the features of the return from exile was the rebuilding of the (first) Temple that had been destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar. In the Luke passage Jesus foretells the destruction of the second and rebuilt Temple (which happened in 70AD). Under the future Emperor Titus the Romans laid siege to Jerusalem for five months. There had been much upheaval within the city. Finally the defenders were overwhelmed and the Temple was set on fire. Over the ensuing weeks the city itself was burnt to the ground. The destruction of the Temple was a watershed moment in Jewish history, the implications of which remain with us to this day. The Sadducees and the Temple-based sects went into eclipse; the Jewish people were scattered and a new form of rabbinic Judaism (arising out of the Pharisees) emerged.

Jesus uses the questions concerning the Temple to speak about his return. It is clear that he has no idea of that exact timing. This time of waiting and being prepared is not depicted as peaceful and idyllic. It is highly unsettled and noted for its natural disasters and betrayals / hatred. The imagery is apocalyptic and ugly but the disciples are to endure. In such times the importance of compassion, mercy, hospitality and tending to the innocent victim (as did the Samaritan) is critical. Those close in time to the destruction of the Temple and the siege of Jerusalem would have been familiar with the terror of the days, famine, intense division on how to respond to the Romans and – so it is said – incidences of cannibalism.


We would be looking to also have another 2 or 3 new Elders be nominated from each congregation so as we will have a balance of representatives from each.

Advent Studies for this year

The coming Season of Advent in the Christian calendar commences on Sunday 27th November. We traverse from a gospel year in Luke into a year featuring Matthew.

This means that we move from a year featuring gentiles and the needy to a focus on Jewish people, the chosen people of God as viewed by Matthew.

We will be engaged in Three studies this advent, at weekly intervals.

The first will be led by Clive Pearson who will provide us with much food for thought. He will draw comparisons between the Advent story of Christmas as presented by both Matthew and Luke and provide some clues about what will follow in Matthew as we explore this Gospel in 2023.

Drawing on the information provided by Clive, the following two weeks of the study will be led by Michael Strong and will first involve reflections on the events leading up to the birth of Jesus. The second will consider the entry of Herod and horrid actions he inflicted on male children in Bethlehem and the flight of Jesus and his family to Egypt. This exploration will continue through to the exchanges between John the Baptist and Jesus.

This Sunday is the last Sunday in the Christian year. We have travelled through the past 12 months since last Advent in the company of Luke. Like each one of the other gospels this one has its own distinctive themes. I wonder what our life together would look like if we evaluated the past year through the lens of Luke's themes and how this gospel us to follow. You may remember that one of the key texts was the agenda-setting passage in Luke 4 where Jesus reads from the scroll of Isaiah: 'the spirit of the Lord is upon me'.

The year ends in what might seem a strange place. The reading set down turns our attention to the last temptation that Jesus faces in this gospel – and it takes place while he is on the cross. It begins with 'If you are the king of the Jews'. It is placed alongside another question 'are you not the messiah?' The gospel of Luke features 24 parables. These parables are all parables of the kingdom.

Jesus' teaching has to do with proclaiming the kingdom of God that is breaking in. The idea that Jesus is 'the king' only emerges in the trial scenes and here on the cross. This kingdom is unlike the pomp and majesty that we might associate with earthly kingdoms and empires. It presumes an understanding of life that is often at a far remove from the politics of our day. The Jeremiah reading looks to a time beyond the distress of Israel's captivity. It is a time and culture that assumes that the people of Israel are like the flock of God's pasture. Their well-being and future will come through new shepherds who will be raised up. The link is made to a 'righteous branch' of David who tended the sheep as a boy and will become Israel's king. These two readings together invite us to consider how we lived out our personal lives and our lives together in the kingdom and how we have allowed ourselves to be shepherded by Christ through all its ups and downs.
