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## 11 December 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Advent *'Who' are we waiting for?*

## Christmas Bowl: The Candle of Joy Isaiah 35:1-10 Matthew 11:2-11

The Advent season is a theme of waiting. The reading from Matthew for this week is intriguingly relevant in a contemporary society like ours. The season of Christmas is observed by all and sundry. It is unavoidable given the marketing pressure that now accompanies Christmas. Were those who were living at the time of Jesus' birth now with us, imagine their response to Christmas trees, Santa Claus and assorted reindeer, the way in which supermarkets are decked out. That is surface stuff, in a way. We come to Christmas in a society that is increasingly indifferent to the Jesus story and the claims associated with him. 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another? It becomes an interesting question in today's world of many faiths and no faiths. For Muslims the answer is clear: Jesus (Isa) is held in high regard as is John the Baptist (Yahya ibn Zakariya): nevertheless, Islam was waiting for Muhammad. In our secular society we often find ourselves waiting for a strong leader, in effect a secular messiah. Or we wait to hear what is happening with interest rates and wonder what this will mean for the year ahead?

From the vantage point of faith, of course, we read the gospels retrospectively. We read stories like this one already in the light of the cross and resurrection. Those hearing Matthew's account of the gospel for the first time were also doing the same, but they may have noticed something we do not. Our lectionary excludes verse 1 of the chapter: 'Now when Jesus had finished instructing his twelve disciples, he went on from there to teach and proclaim his message in their cities.' There are five blocks of teaching in Matthew where there is this kind of formula to do with when Jesus had finished teaching. It mirrors the way in which the people of Israel were familiar with the first five books of the Bible, the Torah.

The reply to John the Baptist's messengers mimics (in a way) the reading of Jesus from the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue in Luke. Is Jesus the messiah (the anointed one / the Christ in Greek). In the Hebrew tradition it is a prophet or a king who is anointed. Unlike Luke Matthew does not establish a family relationship between John the Baptist and Jesus. It is through the Isaiah text (Isaiah 40) that the two are bound together. The disciples of John are invited to consider what they notice about Jesus' ministry – what do they see and hear; Jesus asks the crowds what did they observe with regards to John: the messianic link to a political and courtly kingship is denied as is the expectation of the messiah being merely a prophet.

John is 'more than a prophet' and is preparing the 'way': the first Christians would, of course, be known initially as the followers of the way.

The reading from Isaiah 35 establishes a bridge between John the Baptist in the wilderness and his message of repentance with the return of the people to Jerusalem. The desert rejoices, becomes a place of joy and hope made possible by the coming of God.

## **Advent Studies for this year**

The coming Season of Avent in the Christian calendar commences on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> November. We traverse from a gospel year in Luke into a year featuring Matthew.

This means that we move from a year featuring gentiles and the needy to a focus on Jewish people, the chosen people of God as viewed by Matthew.

We will be engaged in Three studies this advent, at weekly intervals.

The first will be led by Clive Pearson who will provide us with much food for thought. He will draw comparisons between the Advent story of Christmas as presented by both Matthew and Luke and provide some clues about what will follow in Matthew as we explore this Gospel in 2023.

Drawing on the information provided by Clive, the following two weeks of the study will be led by Michael Strong and will first involve reflections on the events leading up to the birth of Jesus. The second will consider the entry of Herod and horrid actions he inflicted on male children in Bethlehem and the flight of Jesus and his family to Egypt. This exploration will continue through to the exchanges between John the Baptist and Jesus.

18 December 2022 Advent 4 Love

Theme: Joseph dreams.... **Christmas Bowl Theme: Candle of Love** 

Sunday 18 December: 8am, 9:30am & 6:45pm **Bible Readings:** Isaiah 7: 1-16

Matthew 1: 18-25

The Christmas story that Luke fastens upon Mary; in the gospel of Mark Joseph is the character who stands out and does so in a way that he does not do so in Luke. There is no visitation, no visit to Elizabeth, no Magnificat. Mary is engaged to Joseph but she is with child through the Holy Spirit. On the other hand Joseph is declared to be a righteous man, a son of David, and is the one who will name Jesus.

And Joseph dreams. One of the features of Matthew's gospel is how he tells the story of Jesus for a community that is apparently more Jewish in background. Luke's was more Gentile, 'non-Jewish'. It is a feature of this gospel to make comparisons between the life of Jesus and incidents in the prior history of the Hebrew people. The familiar refrain is to 'fulfil what was said by the prophet'. These references to Joseph and his dreams remind us of the saga of Joseph in Genesis who gained favour in the Egyptian court through his ability to interpret dreams. In this case it is through a dream that Joseph does not divorce

Mary and is told what to name him. In the 'normal' course of events the son would probably have been named after the 'father' – that is, Joseph.

The reference to Immanuel at Isaiah 7:14 is the first time this name is used in the Bible. Here, the Lord speaks through Isaiah the prophet to Ahaz, king of Judah. At this time in Israel's history, the land was divided between the northern and southern kingdoms (the northern kingdom was often designated "Israel" and the southern "Judah"). Ahaz was afraid because the northern kingdom had joined forces with the neighbouring land of Syria, and he believed they would seek to destroy him and his people. But God tells him, "It shall not stand, and it shall not come to pass" (7:7). Ahaz does not believe him, and so God gives him a sign that this will be so through this popular Christmas Bible verse: "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14).
