Pentecost 5 The Lectionary Readings

The Lectionary Readings provide four readings for each Sunday of the Christian Year, one from the Old Testament, one from the Psalms, one from the Letters in the New Testament and one from the Four Gospels. These readings cycle through three years with Years A, B and C. In 2023 we are in year A. In the season of Pentecost week by week for the most of June, July and August we have readings from Genesis, Romans, and Matthew, and selected Psalms. Not all of these books are read but only particular sections of them.

As you can see there is a wealth of material each week on which a service and a sermon is focused. It is not possible to cover each passage. Usually a particular passage is chosen for proclamation and worship. Sometimes this is related to the other passages and sometimes not. The lectionary is a suggested way to bring the riches of the Bible record to a congregation over the three years. Sometimes a passage not in the lectionary is chosen. Generally in the Uniting Church the lectionary forms the basis for most weeks. In this way an overview of God's dealing with us is presented.

This Sunday July 2nd we have the Genesis 22:1-14 account where God tests Abraham directing him to offer his son Isaac as a sacrifice on a mountain in Moriah. With Isaac bound on top of the altar, Abraham reaches out with a knife to kill his Son. At this critical moment an angel of the Lord stops him. Instead he is directed to a ram caught in a thicket nearby that then becomes the sacrifice. This stark account is often taken to be an illustration of the obedience of faith. The mountain is reputed to be the mountain on which the Temple was built in Jerusalem. The passage has raised many questions. By many it is seen to be the forerunner of the cross, where it is God who gives up his own son, for the purification of the world.

In Romans Paul moves on from last week's first eleven verses of Chapter 6. There, we are baptised into the death of our Lord; therefore we must consider ourselves dead to sin and alive to Christ.

Today in verses 12-23 Paul asks should we let sin control our lives? And answers, no we are not slaves to sin but slaves to righteousness. He finishes with the passage "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. The sermon today revolves around this verse. It is not always appreciated that it is not about sins, but sin. Here sin is a power that enslaves and gives rise to sins. Paul points to an alternate intriguing reality - that we should be slaves to righteousness.

In Matthew 10:40-42 is the culmination of last week's reading about disciples being sent like sheep among wolves. Those who proclaim the kingdom of God will receive an appropriate reward. As one gives one receives.

Next Week

Genesis 24: selected verses give the account of the servant who finds Rebekah, a wife for Isaac.

Romans 7:15–25a. Who will rescue me from this body of death, bound to sin.

Matthew 11:16–19, 25–30. Come to me all you who that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.
