

Reframing Life — Faith-Part 2

Let's continue talking about faith. In normal use faith is used usually as something we are doing, an action word for what we do. (In the Greek faith can either be a verb or a noun, but in English it is usually considered to be a noun.) But if one listens carefully in our time it is usually about the consequences of our trust, commitment or motivation (as we saw in part 1). Faith goes beyond ourself and our actions to trust in others, and for some, God. With regard to God faith can still be limited to my belief and my convictions. There is, however, a dramatic new possibility that we can discover God's action in addition to our own. For the Apostle Paul faith limited to human action alone fades into insignificance. For Paul, faith is a noun that describes and names what God has done. And the central fact is that God has raised Jesus our Lord from the dead.

What a difference between his discovery and our time! In our time, the word faith is overwhelmingly used as an action word, both in the community and in the church too. And as well, there is little awareness of God in Western culture, and even less talk about what God has done. Where in particular in public life and church life do we hear of those whose faith is centered in what God did in the death and resurrection of Jesus? Mostly media silence.

How is it then that the primary form of faith has become human action and attitudes? It is true in the 21st century that we are born into a culture in which faith is limited to human action. Few get to discover the importance of faith as a noun. How different it was inthe first century where, for Paul, the attention was on the faith fact that God had acted in their midst. Yes, there were consequences for human action, community and individual life. But that followed on from the God dimension that reframed all of life in and through Jesus Christ.

In Romans the order was critical. First God's action, then second, the human response. In Romans 7 Paul demolished the common view that it all starts with human action. He cleared the decks for Romans 8. There, Paul is focussed on showing how God in Christ has made it possible for us to live in the Spirit. How does Paul demolish the role of human action before God in Romans 7? He describes how we think of ourselves as good moral people, trying to do the best, and occasionally doing the wrong thing. The result is that so much of religious life is about coming to terms with the wrong done, and seeking forgiveness for each wrong, in order that we may we continue to be good and loving in our lives. We live life from our own point of view. How puzzled people are when we do the best for ourselves and others and the good done curdles and leaves us with unintended and uninvited consequences – let alone with what happens as a result of our worst actions. What are we doing? We substitute our view of what is good for the reality of God's view of the good. And in doing so we turn religion into morality.

For Paul, no, a thousand times no to our individual morality! Through the cross and resurrection Paul found in Christ how the laws of God had been and still are infected and weakened by sin. He saw how he and the leaders who acted for what they saw as the good of their own position and the good of the nation, betrayed the action of God. If we live by the law as we know it, 'weakened by sin', we find the morality that ensues sets people against people and creates division and societal chaos. Rather, Paul calls us in Romans 8 to name what God did in Jesus Christ. For in Him a new world of the Spirit, a new dimension - in fact, the reign and kingdom of God opens up. Paul calls us to set our minds upon the Spirit and the goodness of God, and find the Jesus way of the kingdom. Goodness is not about our view of good, but living in the relationship God makes possible in the Spirit. Paul says set your mind on the Spirit and not on "the flesh", the word he uses to describe the realm of human action where we decide what is good and what our lives will be. That is to live in the realm of death.

There is so much of extraordinary importance for human life in these passages. Above all, there is the invitation to start the experience of living with the Spirit God gives. What we think and where we put our minds really matters, not only for the here and now but eternally. So there is a fundamental question here. Are these empty words of religious hot air in a time of individuality when life is what I am free to achieve as a result of my actions, convictions and faith? Or is life far more mysterious because of what God has done, bringing us in awe to the cross of Christ? In him God discloses a new way of life as we set our minds upon the ever-present Spirit..






Ben Hall's Treasure

GETTY LIVE CONCERT -

Somehow, I saw a notification on my computer about an upcoming Australian live concert by Keith and Kristyn Getty – modern hymn writers from Ireland. Immediately I bought tickets for Sydney Opera House Tuesday 27 June. I am in! I quickly counted 15 Getty composed songs that are used at St Matthew's, mainly at 9.30 worship. I can remember when I was first sent a link to 'In Christ Alone' – music by Keith Getty, words by British songwriter Stuart Townend, one of their earliest collaborations in 2001. The song was sent to me around 2006 by one of my workmates who thought I might like it and the YouTube version suggested the song was held dear by soldiers in the Afghanistan war.

A soldier may well draw inspiration from these words:

'In Christ Alone my hope is found He is my light my strength my song This cornerstone this solid ground Firm through the fiercest drought and storm'

I did some research on this song and found this quote.

"Something about this song makes me cry like a baby. The way the lyrics and melody swirl together is so poignant and beautiful." – Adam Young 2010 age 24.

Some of the other Getty songs that are in regular rotation in our worship include:

By Faith Come People of the Risen King Creation Sings the Fathers Song See What a Morning Living Waters Oh How Good it is – and many more.

You may be able to recall songs or hymns that have defined your faith journey – such is the power of music to open hearts, enable healing, stimulate the mind.

The Gettys are Grammy nominated and Dove Award winning and they have recorded 26 albums. Keith has received an OBE. The Getty family (four daughters) reside both in Northern Ireland and Nashville, Tennessee USA. Their touring company perform worldwide. In 2017 'Christianity Today' named the Gettys "'preeminent' hymn writers who have changed the way evangelicals worship."

SYDNEY OPERA HOUSE

So, to the Opera House concert.

What an opportunity to see the Getty live band here in Sydney for the one and only Australian concert. Their Facebook suggests the family stayed on for an Aussie holiday.

Concert may not be the right word – despite being in the 2500 seat concert hall of Sydney Opera House. The live band and backing singers number about 12. From the first song – it's "Please stand and worship together" - Yes this will be a live worship event.

Actually, there was lots of variety in the two and a half hours concert, of course the whole audience knew the 20+ songs and lifted the roof. That is uncommon in Sydney Opera House.

Just imagine 2500 people singing "This the Power of the Cross, Christ became sin for us...", and many other well known songs from their catalogue.

But there was much more – the children invited on to lead a section of songs, teach actions and be a real part of the event. Many quiet ballads and instrumental sections featuring solos and backing vocalists.



This concert has encouraged Noeleen and myself to continue on with our music ministry and keep searching for great songs to glorify God in worship.
