# Lectionary Notes Pentecost 9 July 30

#### **Genesis 29:15-18**

Isaac wanted his son Jacob to marry into the extended family back in Haran. It was there his father Abraham had heard God's call, and subsequently where he sent his servant to find Isaac's wife Rebecca. In this next generation it happened in a very different way. When Jacob fled from his angry brother Esau this was the one place he could go. He headed north to the land of Haran and offered to work there for his relative Laban. Laban had two daughters, Leah the elder with lovely eyes, and Rachel the younger who was graceful and beautiful. Jacob loved Rachel and offered to work for Laban seven years for her hand. He did and the seven years "seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her." But crafty Jacob is dealing with devious Laban, and the morning after the wedding, he finds he has married Leah. Lots of unanswered questions there! After waiting another week he is then given Rachel. One can imagine the tensions in this new family. And from this family come the twelve sons who become the leaders of the twelve tribes of Jacob, (or Israel as he is later renamed).

#### Psalm 119:129-36

Here are another 8 lines derived from one letter in the Hebrew Alphabet. "Your decrees are wonderful: therefore my soul keeps them"; "Turn to me and be gracious to me, as is your custom toward those who love your name"

#### Romans 8: 26-39

Unique in any of the world's religions is this statement and experience of a creation groaning in labor pains with God is at work in it, to give birth to the children of God. In the midst of the bondage and decay of this creation the adopted children of God hardly know how to pray. We read, "The Spirit intercedes to help us in our weakness"

praying with "sighs too deep for words". And as children of God "We know that all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." And then come the words so often read at funerals in times of greatest sorrow, "Who will separate us from the love of Christ; will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?" Paul declares that nothing in all creation "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus".

#### Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52

There are at least six descriptions of the way the kingdom of heaven is present in our midst, like a mustard seed that grows, like yeast that leavens flour, like treasure hidden in a field, like finding a pearl of great value, like the catch of a net thrown into the sea, and like the master who brings out the treasures of the household. If one hears what is being said, the kingdom of heaven can be disclosed in a seed in the creation, in the work of making bread, in the surprise of discovering treasure, in the search for the most precious, in the gathering of the fruits of creation, and in master who brings out what is а precious. In many ways is the kingdom of heaven experienced.

The last four of these parables are found only in Matthew. The parables are instances of the way God is at work in life in the midst of the hopes and fears of these Jewish Christians in a time of crisis and persecution. The six parables for this Sunday, with the parables of the last two weeks readings resound with a deep affirmation. In particular the kingdom perspective of the sower, and the weeds in the field, and this week, the last parable of the final sorting of the fish in the net, point beyond the crisis that dominated their life and future. Despite what was happening, the goodness of God was at work to bring into being God's final culmination of all. A word for the early Jewish church, and a word for us today.
