Lectionary Notes Pentecost 12 August 20

Genesis 45:1-15

Joseph, sold into slavery by his brothers, is now the all powerful "Lord of all Egypt" He is informed that his brothers were visiting Egypt from Palestine. He directs that they are to be brought to him in a private meeting. They are dismayed at being ushered into the presence of power, not knowing or recognising who he is. They are even more distraught to find that he is their brother. Joseph makes himself known as the one whom they sold, but whom God sent before them to preserve life, and to keep alive his own people through a dreadful famine. "So it was not you who sent me here, but God." (45:8) Joseph then uses his power and position to help the twelve tribes transition to Egypt where in the next centuries they flourish. Egypt becomes home for perhaps four centuries.

There has been a great search to find out who Joseph is in the history of Egypt. It seems most likely that these events occurred in about 1800 years B.C. It is a confusing and changing time in Egypt with very limited archaeological evidence available. There is a broad agreement that the description of Joseph's role and power rings true with the power of a person second to the Pharoah at that time. For Israel, this pivotal time in the history of the twelve tribes provides the setting for them later to become a nation under Moses. Moses' story starts next week in the Lectionary reading.

Psalm 133

This is one of the shortest Psalms in the book of Psalms. It was traditionally recited by Israelites on their way to one of the great festivals, a song of Ascents. A time of anticipation. A time of of God's blessing, God's anointing. "How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity." It is 'very good' and 'pleasant' when we live in God's blessing.

Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32

In chapters 9-11 Paul discloses how God has been at work in human history, through the great victory of the cross, where in the language of his letter to the Corinthians, he declares that God has made foolish the wisdom of the world.(1Cor 1:20). In a world in which laws rule social life, it is clear that no one can keep them all. And even Israel when given God's Law was unable to keep it. God has opened a new way of relationship, that of mercy. All people, Gentile and Jew alike, have been imprisoned in disobedience. But God opened the way through the cross to be merciful to all. It is as he writes in 1 Corithians1:18 "For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."

Matthew 15: 21-28

In the last 70 years this passage in Matthew and the parallel passage in Mark (it is not in Luke) has become a contested text. It has been claimed that Jesus' encounter with this woman from another culture was a decisive breakthrough in his understanding of his mission. What was the breakthrough? In this meeting Jesus said he was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel. After this confrontation with her his mission is seen to be open to women and men of all cultures. It is helpful to compare the earlier passage in Mark with this later passage in Matthew. First we need to keep in mind that Matthew writes from within the life of the Jewish Christian Church which is both threatened and persecuted by Israel after the temple was destroyed in 70 AD.

Let us summarise the passage in Mark in italics and the parallel passage in Matthew underlined.

The Meeting.

MARK The woman is a Gentile, of Syro-Phoenician origin, who comes and begs at Jesus feet to cast a demon out of her daughter and Jesus speaks to her immediately. MATTHEW The woman is a Canaanite who comes at Jesus shouting for her daughter to receive mercy because she is tormented by a demon. Jesus does not answer her, and the disciples urge him to send her away because of her shouting. Then, Jesus says that he was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. In Matthew it is much more of a confrontation with an aggressive and demanding foreigner, with Jesus rejecting her approach.

The Response.

MARK Jesus says, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She counters, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Jesus replies, "For saying this, you may go – the demon has left your daughter. "MATTHEW Jesus says, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs". She says, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from the master's table." Jesus says 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish."

What differences do you find here? The claim that this is a decisive breakthrough is primarily derived from Matthew's account.
