Lectionary Notes Pentecost 13 August 27

Exodus 1:8-2:10

According to the scriptures we have jumped at least four centuries on from Joseph to a time when the Hebrews in Egypt have become a threat to the Pharoah. They are enslaved to build cities, and subject to a deliberate act of genocide to limit their numbers. Finally, the Pharoah commanded every boy born to be thrown into the Nile. One mother of a priestly family defied the orders, first hid her baby for three months, then made a bitumen covered papyrus basket and hid the baby in it, among the reeds on the riverside. The daughter of Pharoah found the baby, and unwittingly paid the mother to nurse him for her. When the boy was older Pharoah's daughter took him as her son and named him Moses. What does his name mean? "She named him Moses "because", she said, "I drew him out of the water." A Hebrew child is raised in Pharoah's court! Through him, in the Exodus, the Lord is going to draw a nation into being out of the water!

Psalm 124

This is another "Song of Ascents" sung as festival attenders climbed the road from Jericho to the temple in Jerusalem. It is a psalm that celebrates the risks that the nation had already run, the truth that the nation has had a precarious history. Jerusalem was almost continually threatened by more powerful neighbors to the West, The East, the North and the South. Against overwhelming odds they had escaped like a bird from the snare of the fowlers. "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth." (v 8)

Romans 12:1-8

In this chapter Paul turns from the place of Israel in God's future, to describe the life of the Church. How remarkable it is that we are to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, not our minds. That is, offer our whole selves, not ideas. Yes, the mind is important, but first the mind needs to be renewed. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds." As a former geologist, my attention was focussed on the Greek word that lies behind the word translated in English as 'transformed'. The word is 'metamorphosis'. It has a special meaning in geology. Metamorphic rocks are a special form

of rock, that have been marinated deep in the earth at high temperatures and pressures. A metamorphosed rock has a similar structure to its original form, but almost every molecule has been replaced by another. In this passage the sense is of a mind marinated in the Spirit as a consequence of the mind set on the Spirit. It is to be immersed in the presence of God allowing God to change and renew our mind. Why is this so important? The metamorphosed mind can discern what is the will of God. How different from the more commonly accepted view that whatever happens is the will of God. No way. The will of God needs to be discerned.

In verses that follow Paul appeals for the members of the community to think of themselves with 'sober judgement' and with the awareness of their own particular gift according to the measure of faith God has given.

Matthew 16:13-20

In three of the gospels Jesus question to his disciples about who he is, is followed almost immediately by him announcing his death in Jerusalem, and his transfiguration. Jesus is preparing the disciples for what is to come.

This event takes place north of the borders of Israel in foreign territory. In Matthew Jesus asks, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" The Son of man is a title that Jesus used and it has a special history. It could mean, a truly human person, or it could mean, as it is in the book of Daniel, the victorious one who brings into being the Kingdom of God for God, the ruler of history. (Daniel 7:13) Jesus then moves from what others are saying to question the disciples. "Who do you say that I am?". Peter declares Jesus to be the Messiah (or the Anointed in Greek), the Son of the living God. Jesus' answer is four fold. The Father has made this known to you; you are Peter and on this rock I will build my church; the gates of Hades will not destroy it, and to you are given the keys of the kingdom of heaven.

There has been much discussion about which Aramaic word for church Jesus would have used in this passage. The Greek word for assembly- ekklesia is used here. This word is only used here and in 18:15-17 in the gospels. Jesus was focussed on proclaiming the kingdom of heaven rather than describing the church.

In Matthew the countdown to the cross has begun!
