Heavenly Invasion Pentecost 18 **October 1st**

Exodus 17:1-7 Philippians 2: 1-13 Matthew 21: 23-32

Psalm 78:1-4, 12-16

Exodus 17:1-7 The privations continue. Journeying further, Moses named a particular place "Massah (test) and Meribah (quarrel) because the Israelites quarreled and tested the Lord, saying, 'Is the Lord among us or not." It is not the last time that has been said! They camped where there was no water. And Moses is on the receiving end of a familiar refrain. "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and our livestock with thirst?" "It is your fault Moses. If the Lord was among us this would not be happening." The lack of water is a serious predicament. Moses is blamed and fears for his life. "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." Moses is told to go on further to Horeb with some of the elders and there at a place, where God is standing, he is instructed to strike a rock with the staff, and water pours out. In this account there is some difference between Mt Horeb and Mt Sinai, where in other places in the O.T. they are seen to be the same. Some commentators see Horeb as the general mountain range and Mt Sinai as one particular mountain within it. Other later commentators see this as a result of the different traditions held within Israel that were woven together at the time of writing. See Numbers 20 for a second and different account of Massah and Meribah. In any case, Moses strikes the rock and water pours forth. Once more the God of the exodus shows that God is the Lord among them. Was it a miracle, with water pouring from a rock? Or did they have to travel to find a place where there was a water bearing rock? Much ink is spilt writing about such matters. Once again, until the next crisis, the Israelites discover again that they are the Lord's people, not Moses' people!

Psalm 78:1-4,12-16 When one makes the connection, it is amazing how often the psalms celebrate the events of the exodus. The first four verses underline the importance of informing the coming younger generation of the things heard and known, the glorious deeds of the Lord. Verses 12-16 directly recall the events that brought the nation into being, the marvels God wrought in crossing the Red Sea and the way they were led and provided for in the wilderness. Verse 15 refers directly to the Exodus 17 passage. "He split rocks open in the wilderness, and gave them drink abundantly as from the deep. He made streams come out of the rock, and caused waters to flow down like rivers.

Philippians 2:1-13 There are three remarkable sections in this passage. In the first, Paul asks that his joy may be complete by the Philippians being a community knit together in full accord with the same mind and love, where members do not look to their own interests but to the interests of others. The second section begins with the words, "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." The next six verses portray the wonder of the mind that was in Christ Jesus. Many scholars believe this is an early Christian hymn. Each word in each verse is filled to the brim with the profundest statements of who he is. Jesus who "though he was in the form of God", "emptied himself", "taking the form of a slave". He "humbled himself and became obedient to the point

of death, even death on a cross". God exalted him and "gave him the name that is above every name so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth". The third section begins with a "therefore" that is so relevant to all who read this hymn, to each community of faith. His command "to work out your own salvation with fear and trembling," leads into the most amazing assertion, "for it is God who is at work among you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure." The you here is a plural you, for Paul has in mind the group in Philippi. But he has so written it that it applies to any group who meet in Christ. How are we in Baulkham Hills working out our salvation with fear and trembling? Do we recognise how God is at work among us, enabling us to do what God wills for his amazing mission to the world? Is it the time to share with each other how we see God at work in our midst.

Matthew 21:23-32 In Matthew, the day after Jesus entered Jerusalem and cleansed the temple, the chief priests and elders came to him and asked him by what authority he had done these things and who had given him this authority. It is the obvious question to ask Jesus who amazingly is there in the temple teaching. Yet it is asked in a way that leaves out any reference to his message of the kingdom of heaven over the previous three years. Jesus answers the question with a question, and then tells a parable that hammers home their response.

First the question, Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin? They could only answer they did not know, because they were caught in a cleft stick. If John's baptism was from heaven why did they not believe him, and if it was of human origin, they were afraid of the crowd who believed it was from heaven. And implicit in the question is the status of Jesus baptism also. They clearly did not believe it was from heaven - because they asked him who had given him this authority. Jesus declined to tell them what was the obvious answer. Second, he told a story about a father of two sons. He goes to one of his sons and asks him to work in the vineyard. This son at first said "No" and then changed his mind and went. The father then goes to his other son and asks him to work. The second son says "Yes", but then changed his mind and did not go. Then comes the critical question. Jesus asks the chief priests and the elders, 'Which of the two did the will of his father?' They answer, 'the first'. Jesus raises the question of both his and John's teaching of the kingdom of heaven, the issue that the chief priests and elders have not acknowledged or dare to acknowledge.

Jesus points out that the tax collectors and the prostitutes who first said no to the will of the Father, like the first son, changed their mind on hearing John the Baptist. They are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. You chief priests and elders did not believe John came in the way of righteousness, but you saw the tax collectors and prostitutes believe, and still you did not change your minds.

In Matthew's reading next week Jesus takes the vineyard conversation further. He raises the stakes even higher by describing what tenants did to the son of a vineyard owner. The telling conclusion "The kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom." No wonder the confrontation escalated further in that last week!
