Heavenly Invasion Pentecost 19 October 8th

Exodus 20:1-4, 7-9, 12-20 Psalm 19 Philippians 3:4b-14 Matthew 21: 33-46

Exodus 20:1-4,7-9,12-20

In Exodus 3, Moses was sent by "I am who I am" to deliver God's oppressed people from Egypt and bring them to a land flowing with milk and honey. The people of Israel, now liberated from Egypt, finally meet the Liberator. Moses has brought the people to the mountain of the Lord where God first directs Moses to tell them these words. "You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself. Now therefore, if you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my treasured possession out of all peoples. Indeed the whole earth is mine, but you shall be for me a priestly kingdom and a holy nation."(Ex 19:4-6) The people are told these words and answer as one, "Everything that the Lord has spoken we will do." The people consecrate themselves, and hear God's words.

"I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol. You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord." (Ex 20:2-4a,7a) A further seven commandments are given. And after all the laws, the directions are given to build a Tabernacle, where the 'I am who I am" will be present with the nation. (Ex 23-32)

There is a broad misunderstanding that the ten commandments are laws to live by. The Commandments are much more than laws, they are guidelines for living in the covenant relationship God has established. The commandments describe the relationship the people will have with God, with parents, and all others. Each commandment describes a specific element of relationship, and gives the limits to that relationship. With others we are not to take life, take property, lie, or subvert a neighbor. With family, we are to honor parents and not subvert marriage. With God we are to be true, not make our own god or abuse God.

Psalm 19

The psalm is a celebration of the way the creation discloses the glory of God, and especially the law of God. Verse after verse extols the effect of the law. The Law revives the soul, rejoices the heart, enlightens the eyes, brings rightness, and is a treasure greater than gold, and sweeter than honey. But the law also warns, alerts to hidden errors, and exposes the insolent. It is a fitting psalm to accompany the Exodus reading of the giving of the commandments. And the psalm ends with a prayer that is heard often in the life of God's people.

"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer."

Philippians 3:4b-14.

Paul gets to the point of his letter to the church in Philippi. He wants to encourage them to resist the flesh and worship in the Spirit of God. It is an illustration of Paul's theme in Romans 8. Don't be fooled by the flesh, but set your mind on the Spirit. He then spells out what for Paul was the flesh, the human perspective that once controlled his own life.

In Jewish society he had it made. A true Israelite, member of the tribe of Benjamin, a powerful Pharisee with a noted reputation, morally blameless, a national leader at the forefront of maintaining the purity of the law and the temple. He had worked hard for his achievements. Now he sees this as rubbish in comparison with the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus his Lord. He is not interested in the righteousness that comes from the law, but the righteousness that comes from God, based on faith. His citizenship is already in heaven, not in Jerusalem; he does worry about that. He wants to live out this citizenship through knowing Christ and the power of the resurrection, and sharing in Jesus sufferings in the making known of what God has done. He is clear he is still on the way, pressing on into the prize of God's heavenly call in Christ Jesus. We too can hear his call. Brother and sisters stand firm in the Lord!

Matthew 21:33-46

The Prophet Isaiah had declared "the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting." (Isa 5:7a) The prophet brings the word of the Lord. "What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it?" (This vineyard dug and cleared of stones, planted with choice vines, and a wine vat, guarded by a watchtower.)

When Jesus tells this parable about a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower, the parable is about the house of Israel. And those listening knew it, especially the chief priests and the Pharisees there in the crowd in the temple. In the parable, the tenants took over the vineyard. At harvest time they killed all who came to collect the landowner's produce. And when the landowner's son came they saw the chance to kill him and get his inheritance. It is not subtle – the chief priests and Pharisees hear a direct repudiation of their leadership as the leaders of Israel. They wanted to arrest Jesus immediately but feared the backlash from the crowds who listened to him and considered him a prophet.

"Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom." (Matt 21:43) They had to find a way to remove him from the temple.

It does not take long for those leaders of Israel to turn the parable into the reality of what happened in their midst in this week of celebrating the exodus.

Truly, the Son invites us into the vineyard that God has prepared for us: this fruitful kingdom, with the Spirit of God, where the ten commandments and the tabernacle have become for us the two commandments and the risen Son in whom we live and move and have our being.
