Something to think about

October 29th 22nd Sunday After Pentecost

Lectionary Readings:

Deuteronomy 34:1-12 Psalm 90:1-6, 13-17 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8 Matthew 22:34-46

Do we really want to know God and know what God wants from us? You might think that the obvious answer for those of us in the Church should be, "Yes". However, I am not sure, if I am being honest, that I really want to know – or I do really want to know, but I am not always keen to know, because I know that God will usually call me out of my comfort zone.

This week in the Gospel reading, we have the classic passage about the 'Greatest Commandment.' We love the Lord, our God, with everything and love our neighbour as ourselves. It's simple, right? Most of us are really familiar with this reading, but are we really familiar with loving God with our all – everything, all the time and in every opportunity. We probably even think that we are doing it, or at least trying to do it.

The Bible Project has some great videos to help us understand this idea of giving our all to God as love. The passage that Jesus quotes comes from Deuteronomy 6:4-5 The word for soul in Hebrew is not about spirit or soul, but is 'nephesh' فِوْنِهْ



literally means throat, but is not just our throat but all of us. The word heart is 'lev' שלע שיאונה is all not just our physical heart or the place or our emotions. For ancient people the heart was physical, the emotional centre, the place of our thinking and the agency of our choices. Then there is the word for strength which is 'me'od,' שמאר שאונה the Greek translation uses the word dunamis δύναμις – which is about power, potential or ability (all of which is more than just strength), but Hebrew me-od is about "muchness." So, we can see that the ancient understanding about what we should love God with is all about the different facets of our all or everything. That of course takes us back to why we might be wanting to give God our all, but at the same time reluctant to.

So, we should love God with our all - that is our everything, including all our effort. Then we hear that the second command is not just like it, but the Greek word is homoia ouoïoc, from which we get our prefix 'homo' which means the same or one with. This command is that we love our neighbour as ourselves. This is really important. To love God is to love our neighbour. My go-to passages of 1 John 3 & 4 emphasise this. 1 Corinthians 13 notes that without love, faith and everything else in life is useless or worthless. For me this hits home as to what true worship is. It has less to do about gathering in a special temple-like building and singing praises to God, but about going and doing what God calls us to - love our neighbour. We all then know who our neighbour is from the version of this story in Luke with the Parable of the Loving Neighbour (traditionally wrongly referred to as the 'Good Samaritan'). If you are not sure that I have got things right, you can go forward a couple of chapters to Matthew 25:31-46 and get confronted by the Parable of the Sheep and Goats. Here is where the discomfort of loving God with our all comes back. We want to but are often worried about the cost.

Finally, what does it mean to love ourselves. For me is love – agape $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$ love is about giving of our best to bring out the best in others or work for the best for others. So, loving ourselves is balanced by loving our neighbour. We naturally want the best for ourselves most of the time, but to do justly, love with mercy and walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8) calls more out of us than just looking out for our self-interest.

Then, the issue becomes about how do we get over or around our selves. We have to let God, tune into God and allow God as Spirit to empower us to be our better selves, just as God as Christ calls us to be through loving with our all. That is where Christian meditation and the contemplative tradition becomes very helpful. It helps us be still and know that God is God. It helps us develop self-discipline and self-control, along with other Fruit of the Spirit such as love, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness and faithfulness. Many of us know little about Christian meditation, but is a healthy and important part of our Christian tradition. Here is a link to a video to help you learn more about it. If we want to love God with our all, then we need all the help that we can get. We need God's help and we need to help ourselves (a.k.a. love ourselves). If we want to love others, for to do so is to love and truly worship God, then we have the help of each other as the Church. In all of this, we are not alone, nor do we have to do it on our own. God is with us, guiding us, supporting us, empowering us, but most of all, loving us. We love God because God first loved us 1 John 4:19, and we can love with our all, because as Christ, God loved us with God's all.

That is something to think about.

FRANK HEBBARD and the LOST PHOTOS OF WW2

Margo is the narrator and Chris will speak his fathers actual words which were written down in the last months of Franks life. They tell of how Frank came to make a photographic record of his WW2 Australian Army Hospital unit, 2/5 Aus General Hospital, and how he and another 168 members of his unit volunteered to stay with critically wounded soldiers as the Germans overran Greece.

He continued to take photos behind enemy lines while helping to attend over 2,800 wounded allied POWs for the next 8 months. Some 600 of these photos were eventually printed for the first time in 2011, a full 70 years after they were taken.

After the history, (about 20 minutes) photos will be shown on the screen and then members are invited to inspect a range of Frank's memorabilia.
