



Getting to Know More About Jon

Hello. This is my first piece for **In Focus**. Can I begin by thanking everyone

for the warm welcome that I and my family have received from all of you in the congregation. It is a big thing to take on someone new, especially, in the ministry leadership role. Thank you for the lovely words of encouragement and for your patience as I get set up and inducted into your culture and routines. Thank you for your patience as I make some subtle changes, and some less subtle. This is something that can be challenging as change, especially to things that have been in place for a while, can mess with our heads and our sense of normal. Some of the change that I bring has to do with me finding a sense of comfort in a new community and comes from what feels normal for me as Ifind a new normal in our wonderful community.

Some might like to know a bit about me. You may have met my wife, Lynda, and some have met our daughters, Emma, Rachel and Annika. I was originally, going to be an architect, and worked in an architectural firm for my first year out of school. Due to some poor choices on my part, I didn't get into the architectural course at university that I had planned on doing, so I pivoted to study architectural drafting for a year at TAFE and then apply again. However, at the end of that year, despite doing very well at TAFE and still enjoying architecture, I could see myself sustaining the life of studying part-time and working full-time for the six years it would take to complete the course. So, I started looking for an alternate pathway. As a friend of the family had told my mum that I would make a good primary school teacher, I started to consider that. I ended up studying Primary Teaching at Kuringgai College, which then became UTS – Kuringgai. I completed my Diploma of Teaching and then planned to do the final one year to gain my Bachelor Degree at Macquarie University.

As it happened, whilst I was on annual field exercises for Sydney University Regiment of the Army Reserves, I found out that I had been placed as a teacher at West Pennant Hills Public School. I taught there for seven years, commencing in 1991. In that time I got married, completed my Bachelor of Education and got called into ordained ministry. I then studied for three years at United Theological College, where we had our first and second daughters.

Despite planning to end up in a congregational placement, in 2001 I found myself in school chaplaincy at Pymble Ladies' College, where I worked in ministry for eight years. Annika came along in 2002, I started and failed to complete an Honours Degree, and things went along until 2009 when I swapped schools and took on chaplaincy at Ravenswood School for Girls. During that time, we were first members of Gordon Uniting Church, which was our home church that I candidated from and where Lynda and I met, got engaged and were married. We then moved to Turramurra Uniting and were there for about ten years until coming to St. Matthew's.

I have held a few roles in the wider Church such as Chair of the Synod Selection Panel, been on committees, been Zone Coordinator for Upper North Shore Zone of Sydney Central Coast Presbytery. I am currently the Advocate for the National Assembly of the Uniting Church's Transforming Worship Circle of Interest and a panel member of the Growing in Faith circle of interest. These are initiatives of assembly to encourage and resource us as the Church in various aspects of our faith and discipleship and our life together. Transforming Worship is about exploring how our worship is transformative for us, and how we can enhance our worship experiences so that they are more transformative. It is also about looking at what worship is and how we go about it as the Church, and considering ways that we might transform our understanding of worship and maybe some of the forms that it takes to better connect us with God and God's mission. I thought that it might be helpful to share some of my work and thinking in this area. You don't have to agree with it, but it might help you understand where I am coming from and why I do some of what I do.

Jon's Core Glossary

Worship - The act of giving glory to God. The Bible in many instances points out, though, that this is as much if not more about our actions than our words. The greatest act of worship is to live the way God calls us to and to join God in God's mission.

Liturgy – from the Greek λ ειτουργία/ leitourgia – often translated as 'the work of the people.' comes from a Greek word derived from two words – 'laos,' which means people, and 'ergo' which means work. In modern times this work is often translated as function. So, our liturgy/ work/function as the people of God is to both be disciples and disciple others, and to love God with all our being, which is best expressed through loving our neighbour as ourselves.

Glory – In Greek this is doxa. We get the suffix '-doxy' from it. Orthodoxy, is thus, right-glory. Glory is a complex word, but God, as Jesus, talked about being glorified by being lifted on the cross. It is about recognising the greatness of God. For us as the people of God, we best give glory to God, by honouring God's call to us to love, for God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them.

Minister – a person who serves others by using their gifts, strengths, skills, talents etc. Ministry is for all of us for, as the Basis of Union of the Uniting Church points out, we all have gifts from God as Spirit, and there is no gift without its corresponding service/ministry.

Anyway, hopefully, this gives you some insight into my journey and some of what makes me tick. I am happy to talk about it and answer questions about this or anything, as we continue to get to know each other and look to growing together in faith and discipleship as we encourage each other towards love and good works.

When I ask you to listen to me and you start fiving advice you have not done what I asked.

When I ask you to listen to me and you begin to tell me why I shouldn't feel that way, you are trampling on my feelings.

When I ask you to listen to me and you feel you have to do something to solve my problem, you have failed me, strange as that may seem.

Listen! All I asked was that you listen, not to talk or do—just hear me.

And I can do for myself; I'm not helpless. Maybe discouraged and faltering, but not helpless.

When you do something for me that I can and need to do for myself, you contribute to my fear and weakness.

But when you accept as a simple fact that I do feel what I feel, no matter how irrational, then I can quite trying to convince you and get about the business of understanding what's behind this irrational feeling. And when that's clear, the answers are obvious and I don't need advice.

Irrational feelings make sense when we understand what's behind them.

Perhaps that's why prayer works, sometimes, for some people because God is mute— God does not give advice or try to fix things. God just listens and let's you work it out for yourself.

So please listen and just hear me. And if you want to talk, wait a minute for your turn; and I'll listen to you.

THAT'S MY TEAM was the theme of the UNITING YOUTH CAMP 2023 UYC

this year. During my time at the camp, I made numerous observations and came to certain conclusions concerning the nature of faith and community. Such revelations can be drawn back to observations within interactions between fellow campers as well as the overall conditions of the social environment as well as the words of the guest speaker.

If I were to describe the camp in one way I would call it, accepting. Each time I expected someone to say something nasty and judgmental, nothing would come. It was an environment where the holy spirit could be seen through the encouragement and lack of judgment in the group. Many had the courage to be open in front of a large group, receiving only kindness in return. What is that if not God at work?

The general mood of peace and open mindedness was truly a space where one could be free to explore their identity as a Christian within an environment offering only support. By being surrounded by other young people of faith, I myself have become further sure of my previous beliefs as well as coming to new conclusions. The previous beliefs being that because God is a force of love and acceptance, by extension his kingdom (or team) is the same. A place where mutual trust exists, an unspoken kind where one knows that they are in a place where God is present.

In a short time, I observed many fast connections as well as rekindled past friendships. Even those who had very little in common and in most other environments would often clash, were able to treat each other with basic respect and human decency. Friendships were formed because people were aware that they perhaps do not know very much about those around them, but they do know that they have a love of God in common creating foundation for fellowship and lasting friendships. Friendships that might continue digitally following the end of the camp and friendships that will stay on hold until the next camp rolls around. Even if those who meet at camp never meet again, they will always carry a small part of another person around them. A shared joke, a moment of connection or a fond memory. Through the activities and time spent in worship there was a team built. Whether that be mutual enjoyment of activities, making a friend by playing a sport or sitting with someone during meals.

Through those who came to speak at the camp I learnt many lessons that I would not previously realize could even be learnt. People from across the country brought their lives with them, the faith that has come from lived experiences. their faith and passion were contagious, in worship and in practice. When seeing how God has worked in the lives of so many there is a sense of comfort in knowing that God does not abandon his people, that he provides resource for change, comfort in struggle and triumph over hatred.

I admit I was initially doubting how much I would enjoy the camp, with a bad feeling that I would be judged or alone for its entirety. Instead, I found myself immersed in the team, the community that is faith in Christ.

FRANK H€BBARD and the LOST PHOTOS OF WW2

Margo is the narrator and Chris will speak his fathers actual words which were written down in the last months of Franks life. They tell of how Frank came to make a photographic record of his WW2 Australian Army Hospital unit, 2/5 Aus General Hospital, and how he and another 168 members of his unit volunteered to stay with critically wounded soldiers as the Germans overran Greece.

He continued to take photos behind enemy lines while helping to attend over 2,800 wounded allied POWs for the next 8 months. Some 600 of these photos were eventually printed for the first time in 2011, a full 70 years after they were taken.


After the history, (about 20 minutes) photos will be shown on the screen and then members are invited to inspect a range of Frank's memorabilia.
