Something to think about

26 November 26th Sunday after Pentecost Christ the King Sunday

Lectionary Readings:

Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 Psalm 100 Ephesians 1:15-23 Matthew 25:14-30

Do The Right Thing

So, we come to the end of the Liturgical Year. This week is Christ the King Sunday. Next Sunday begins a new Church year with the Season of Advent. The theme for St Matthews this Sunday is 'Do the Right Thing.' This of course for those who have been around a while has been the core of an Australian campaign about not littering. It has a simple message which is aimed at triggering our conscience. Of course, the words don't just stand by themselves, but are accompanied by a logo of a person throwing rubbish in a bin or waste receptacle. What I hadn't really noticed before was the green circular arrow that goes around the logo. This I assume is to indicate that having done it once we should continue to do it over and over again. It is a very clever and simple design and we will come back to the idea of the arrow in a bit.



Over the last month we have been exploring a series of troubling and enigmatic parables that seem to all be bunched around a theme of being about the 'end times.' Daniel Gibb reminded us, in his sermon last Sunday night, that these are known as Jesus' eschatological parables. Eschatological is the big theological name for teachings/doctrine about the 'last things' which include such things as the second coming of the Christ, immortality of the soul, rebirth, resurrection, migration of the soul, and the end of time, as well as the fulfillment of the coming of the Kingdom of Heaven. It comes from the Greek word ἔσχατον (eschaton) which literally means 'last' or even 'least.' It is a common word and we see it used in describing the last shall be first and even in the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant where that servant is locked away until every last shekel has been paid of the debt which was reinstated when they failed to forgive another servant in the way that they had been forgiven.

This idea of last or least, I think is the key thing that we often miss in our trying to understand what Jesus meant. Too often, like the people in Jesus' times, we get caught up in trying to work out when the ends times will be and what signs might help us work out that they are coming. When we consider all the parables Jesus puts forward, and his actual explicit teachings about the last or end times, I think that the emphasis is on that this is the last thing that we should be thinking about and the least important thing to be worrying about. The fact that Jesus will return to close and complete all things is important, but his message seems to be consistently quite clear, that there is no way to know when that will be and no real point in worrying about it. In fact, why should we care? It will happen when it happens, and if we are just wanting to know what signs to look out for, so that we can rush to clean ourselves up at the last minute so that we don't get caught out? then we have missed the point and are effectively wanting to cheat the system. The point in all this seems be that we should just do the right thing, and not be worried about if we are going to be caught out doing the wrong thing.

We should do the right thing because it is the right thing to do. Jesus seems to frame the right thing as loving God with all our being, after all God loves us with all God's being, and this is indistinguishable from loving our neighbour as ourselves. This is the way of God which we learn in its fullest through God as the person of Jesus, the Messiah/Christ, who is the Word of God (at least as John 1 describes it). The way of Jesus is the way of the cross. It is about following the Servant King, by serving others. It is about laying down our lives for others as God, as Christ, lay down his life for us. It is about forgiving others as we have been forgiven. It is about discipling others as we have been discipled. It is about joining in the work of God, because God is already at work and waiting and wanting us to join. It is about loving others as we have been loved by God – this is the greatest thing of all, because God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them.

At the end of the liturgical year, we are reminded not only of the return of Christ the King, both eschatologically and in the Nativity, but also how it is the last thing to worry about. We are called to faith and discipleship and all the work that this involves. The most important and first thing that we are called to do is the right thing, and then do it again and again and to keep doing it, just as the green circular arrow in the logo reminds us to. How we go about doing it and what that means for each of our individual lives and for our life as a community called the Church, well, that is what we will have another year to help us continue to learn and think about. This week, thought, the Parable of the Sheep and Goats sets out some fairly explicit and practical ways to walk in the way of Jesus and not get caught out (not being caught out is something to worry about, because if we are doing the right thing then there is nothing to worry about if and when all things come to an end).


