

Changing Our Minds After Epiphany

Last week we heard in Mark 1, verses 14 and 15, how Jesus proclaimed that the good news of the Kingdom of God has come near and so we should repent and believe the good news. Repentance and repenting has become a loaded word for many people. It is not a popular word for people in or outside of the Church. It has Christian culture all about become in turning from sin, and sin has become all about all that we do wrong, and so repentance is often seen about confessing our sin to God. All of this is theologically correct to a degree, but it can lead us to miss the point of what real repentance Seeing is. repentance as about asking for forgiveness can lead to a fixation with a doctrine that Jesus died on the cross to forgive us our sin, and that if we believe in Jesus Christ and confess our sin we can be forgiven and enter into heaven. Whilst this is a true and right belief we can miss the deeper focus and mission of God when we don't understand the deeper meaning of repentance.

The word that Jesus is quoted as using and which is translated as 'repent' in Greek is μετανοέω [metanoeo] (or the participle form of it). This word in essence means to change one's mind. This changing of mind is not only a cognitive thing that just happens in our head, but it is supposed to result in a changing of our attitude and behaviour. Repent it's sometimes reduced to being described as a turning around and heading in the opposite direction, or as simply confessing our wrongdoing. referenced the notion of turning around in my sermon last Sunday and even had an image of it in the active discipleship and applied learning activity sheet. This isn't wrong, but what we should remember is why we need to turn around and go in a different way. This is about changing our minds, and not just changing them like we sometimes do on a whim or because we need to go back and get something we forgot before we continue on our way. It is a realisation that we are going in the wrong direction, and in this case, it is about our thinking being set on the wrong notion of where we should be heading. That is why we need to change our mind about our direction and then work to turn ourselves around and go the way that we should. We need to align our direction to that of the coming Kingdom of God.

Thus, repentance / μετάνοια [metanoia] isn't simply confessing our sin in order to be forgiven. As our minds are changed from wrong thinking to right thinking, then that will lead to an acceptance that we were doing the wrong thing or not doing the right thing which itself was failing to be the people God calls us to be. Confessing this is important, but it isn't just about being forgiven. When we get stuck in that kind of thinking around sin and forgiveness then faith or religion becomes about guilt. The focus gets caught up with the negative being about wrongdoing. Here is where the notion of repentance as metanoia as a changing of our minds becomes really important.

If we get our thinking right, then we get our behaviour right. God is calling us to a better way – to right thinking and right doing. The Kingdom of God comes near and shows us a better way of being. This way leads to life in abundance and life full of meaning and purpose. We discover a joy of living and a sense of peace. Our focus is a positive and constructive one about the right thing and heading in the right direction. When we get off track or get caught in the wrong stuff or wrong way, it is about a return to the right way. It is about correction not fear of punishment.

Of course this is not an easy way of living, nor is it a comfortable way of living, after all the way is called 'The Way of the Cross.' However, just like healthy living requires physical effort and exercise and discipline in what we eat, health living also requires spiritual and theological effort and exercise


and discipline in the ideas and values we consume. When we get healthy in our thinking, we get healthy in our living, and the emphasis is on wellness not on flaws and failings. Flaws and failings do need to be addressed, but it is in the context of becoming healthier and having a better quality of life.

Here also it is important to change some of our thinking from seeing all this as just being about ourselves as individuals. The Kingdom of God is greatly focused also on its as communities and as a society. The metanoia repentance is as much about a changing of our minds about how we relate to each other and our world. God's presence with us as the person, Jesus who is the Christ reminds us that we need to change our minds as we hear God's Word and the call to justice, equity, grace, love and transformation of not only ourselves as single people, but as a people together so that all are cared for and no-one goes without what is essential.

As always this is about knowing God, the God who is near, not just as a comfort, but also as a discomfort. God discomforts us by changing our minds. In knowing God, we come to know what it good, just as we come to know good in our lives. Knowing God and knowing good then flows into good living, which isn't just good and comfortable living for us, but good and healthy living which then moves us to share that with all. Repentance is about changing our minds for good and that is definitely something good to think about.
