





Something to think about

4 February 5th Sunday of After Epiphany

Lectionary Readings:

Isaiah 40:21-31 Psalm 147:1-11, 20c 1 Corinthians 9:16-23 Mark 1:29-39

Knowing God

We are in the second last week of the liturgical season of After Epiphany. It is good to remember that epiphany means an appearance or manifestation especially of a divine being; a usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something; an intuitive grasp of reality through something (such as an event) usually simple and striking; or, an illuminating discovery, realization, or disclosure. However, I think that an epiphany can also be a slow burn process and an arriving to an understanding over time. After, all that is what the season of After Epiphany is essentially about, given that it is over several weeks and happens every year. Thus, our spiritual work in this season, remembering that liturgy means at heart, 'the work of the people,' is to better seek to understand what it means that grasp and God is with us.

God entered into humanity in such a profound way in the person of Jesus, and is always with us and working within us and all things as the Holy Spirit. Our epiphanic work is to first understand this conceptually and then come to understand it in our spirits/ hearts that we might have [metanoia] which is a changing of our minds which works a change in our being and living. This is the difference of knowing about God and knowing God. In Biblical Greek there are

two main ideas for knowing. The first is $\vec{oi}\delta\alpha$ [oida] which is a cognitive knowing. This is where we understand something in our head as a concept.

In last week's Gospel reading, Mark 1:21-28, a demon in a man knew Jesus. It cried out, "I know who you are, the Holy One of God." This was a knowing about Jesus. It understood who Jesus was, but this was not a personal relationship kind of knowing. Paul talked about this kind of knowledge in the reading that we had in 1 Corinthians 8:1-13. However, he wisely notes, "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by God. Here Paul also uses the word [gnosis (silent 'g') where we our word knowledge comes from]. However, he is clearly making the distinction from one form of knowing and another even though like many languages words can be used interchangeably at times. What is important is that knowing about something or someone, especially God, is not the same or as knowing them personally.

Here is a helpful explanation about this deeper form of knowing:

"The primary Hebrew term for knowledge, yada, means "to know by experience," including such things as afflictions (1 Kings 8: 38), loss (Isa. 47: 8), disease/grief (Isa. 53: 3), and judgment (Ezek. 25: 14). Also, since both] μτιμαα] and γινώσκω [ginosko] also designate sexual intercourse on the part of the husband (Gen. 4: 1, 17, 25; Matt. 1: 25; Luke 1: 34) and the wife (Num. 31: 18, 25; Judg. 21; 12), it implies that "to know" does not simply mean to have theoretical knowledge of an object and its nature.

Knowing God continued

Rather, it refers to a personal relationship between the knower and the object known, a relationship characterized by care, concern, and importance." - Dr. Davey Naugle, Dallas Baptist University, Summer Institute in Christian Scholarship, 'What is Knowledge? So, we can know about something, but that is not the same as knowing it. We can know a theory of how to do something, but there is a great difference from knowing how to do it and knowing how to actually do it without error. We can know about something like grief, but it is something very different to know grief through experiencing it. We can know about someone, through reputation or from how others describe them, but it is not until we meet them in person and literally get to know them, that we can say that we know them. The same is true about God. We can know about God but not know God, like the prophet Samuel did as a boy when he ministered to God but did not know God (1 Samuel 3: 1 & 7).

We have several main ways for knowing God

- Scripture
- Experiences of God
- Living the love of God to others
- Contemplative Prayer and meditation

The last of these is one that we may not be as familiar as we might be. Contemplative prayer in this way is not so much about talking to God, but listening for God. Prayer in this way is well described by Father Richard Rohr. He explains it this way, "it is really a different form of consciousness. It is not saying prayers, It is living in constant unitive union with God and everything around you so that whatever you do is prayer." Here is a link to a video in which he talks about contemplative prayer. In this he suggests that the way that Jesus went into a lonely place to pray was contemplative prayer.

The other way of knowing God, at least according to Saul/Paul is the manifesting the Fruit of the Spirit. If these speak to the nature of God, then when we practice these things then we come to know through our experience what God is like. It is when we exercise each of what is listed as Fruit, then we know what God is like as we have to work to make these things which are part of our being into part of our being. The best simple definition of contemplation that Richard Rohr can give is "a long loving look at the Real." This he says leads us to the threshold of contemplation and a deeper

Spending more effort and doing more work to know God instead of just knowing about God is something epiphanic to think about.




Worship Leader Needed
