Something to think about 18th February Lent 1

Lectionary Readings:

Genesis 9:8-17 Psalm 25:1-10 1 Peter 3:18-22 Mark 1:9-15

Baptism – Plunged into the Faith and Family of Jesus

Have you been baptised?

If not, would you like to be. Please talk with me or with one of the elders if you would like to be baptised or confirmed.

We all know what baptism is, but do we know what it means? And, even if we do, have we got more to learn?

It is interesting, even as someone who has been doing baptisms for decades, that I am still learning what it means. I am learning about baptism itself and discovering new understandings about how the rite and sacrament developed and how Church understands baptism to mean — i.e. our doctrine or teaching. I am also learning what it means to be personally and what my baptism baptises me into and what I am supposed to do about all that.

The word translated as 'baptism' is βαπτίζω [baptizo] in Greek and it means plunging and immersing. It is interesting to note that it isn't just about a sacrament or ritual. The Church has teachings and doctrines about baptism and how it should be carried out, where and when it should be practised, and who can be baptised, and what they need to do in order to be baptised. These are all well and good, as well as being helpful and constructive, but the reality is that baptism is a bit enigmatic and there is a degree of mystery to it. This is partly to do with the fact that the Bible doesn't have a clear set of instructions as to what it means, nor how it should be done. The Biblical witness about baptism is quite complex.

John the Baptist baptised people. His according to Luke was a baptism of repentance and the forgiveness of sin. (Luke 3:1-3). We don't know a lot about how John developed his understanding of baptism, or about how this tradition (if it was actually a tradition - for John may have created the ritual himself). If you are interested in learning more about baptism and its link with the Jewish tradition here is a great video from the YouTube channel, 'Religion for Breakfast' which might be worth watching: The Pre-Christian Origins of Baptism. Baptism – Plunged into the Faith and Family of Jesus continued

Jesus was baptised by John in the Jordan River. Here we get our first mystery.

If John's baptism was about repentance for the forgiveness of sin, why would Jesus be baptised in this way being, as the traditional Christian doctrine proclaims, that he was without sin. Anyway, Jesus is baptised, and an amazing epiphany occurs, which is probably the reason it is often included in the first week of Lent, which is the first Sunday after the season of After Epiphany. However, later in the gospels, Jesus goes on to talk about baptism in a different way and infer that it is about the cross and the disciples will be baptised in this kind of baptism like he was. James and John aske to sit at Jesus's left- and right-hand side "in glory" and Jesus replied with the question, "Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with?" (Mark 10: 38) he then tells them, "You will drink the cup I drink and be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with," and we might assume that it applies to all the disciples and to us. So, baptism has to do with the cross and the way of the cross.

Later at the end of the Gospel of Matthew we have Jesus giving the disciples what we call, 'The Great Commission' when he says, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." It is this that perhaps has had the greatest (excuse the pun) influence on baptism and the Church. As the story of the Church unfolds, we have

a range of stories, of people being baptised by the side of the road, others having whole households baptised. Some receive the Holy Sprit at their Baptism others have the Spirit, but haven't been baptised and so are then baptised. Theologically, it is a complexity to weave into our understanding. There is also the question of God already being present at all times and in all places with us as Spirit. So, it is not strange that there is a lot to consider and learn, even after all these years about what baptism is and what it means for us.

The Gospel reading this week also jumps us back to the call of Jesus to repent and believe the good news that the Kingdom of God has come near. So, baptism seems to also have something to do with the Kingdom. It is more than just a membership rite or a one-off ceremony to mark our conversion, and more than confirmation in the faith and family of Jesus. It is actually more about our acceptance and commitment to being immersed in the new way of the Kingdom and all that that means. It is a dying and rising to self, and whilst there is a sense of washing away of sin transgression, our baptism is an ongoing metanoia (changing of our heart, mind and being) to be soaked in God's grace, but knowing the need for transformation of ourselves, our living and our world. It is captured in a rite and sacrament, but is something that we can recall, remember, and re-affirm at any time. In fact, maybe it is part of our big list of things to be mindful of all the time. It is certainly something to think about.



UNITING CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA SYNOD OF NSW & ACT STAMP COMMITTEE
