Something to think about 3rd March

3rd Sunday in Lent

Lectionary Readings:

Exodus 20:1-17 Psalm 19 1 Corinthians 1:18-25 John 2:13-22

Being the Temple of God

A Temple is a place where people go to worship a god or deity or to practice faith spirituality, and religion. God has resisted being in a temple and in Jesus we see the temple torn down and rebuilt. At least that is what Jesus is saying in this week's Gospel reading after he cleared the Temple forecourt.

"'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' ...he was speaking of the temple of his body."

John 2: 19 & 21

Jesus leads us to what we should understand the temple to be. To make this theology really clear we first hear Jesus being proclaimed by angels as 'Immanuel – which means God is with us (Matthew 1:23). Then at the climax of Jesus's ministry we have the curtain in the Temple torn in two from top to bottom. The curtain which separated everything and everyone from the Holy Holies where God was thought to be most present is ripped open. God has fully left the building. Then Jesus breathes his Spirit on the disciples (John 20:22) and just before his ascension he declared that he is with them to the end of the age (Matthew 28:20). We then have the story of Pentecost and the growth of the Church with people receiving the Spirit of God. We are the Body of Christ who is the temple of God.

"Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. All of you together are Christ's body, and each of you is a part of it."

- 1 Corinthians 12:27

"As you come to him, the living Stone—rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him— you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ."

- 1 Peter 2: 4&5

The Bible Project helps us understand how the locus – the position of presence of God - is with people, not in a building. It got stuck in a building for a while, not literally or actually stuck in a box, for God is always everywhere. However, in the physical temple God got stuck in people's minds as being there. In Jesus the presence of God moves toward us and then into us. Thus, our religion is not about worshipping in a temple, but in living out the presence and love of God into the world. Our worship doesn't now happen in a temple or a temple like building, but happens in our living and being incarnations of the love of God as we seek to be the Body of Christ together.

Unfortunately, probably when Christianity became the state religion of Rome, we have sort of put God back into the box of a templish (being temple-like) building, with priests and altars and with the Church calling what we do in these spaces "worship." Even, in protestant traditions such as the Uniting Church where we don't have priests, and we have a 'Communion table' not an altar, and we have 'ministers' and it is only they (plus a few licenced lay people) who can preside over the sacred ritual that take place on these altar-like places. It is in these Church spaces, which we even call churches, that we gather to worship. We hold our worship services, and even in our meetings we have devotional elements which we call 'worship.' Worship has become religious ritual limited to mostly a specific time and place each week.

Our gatherings as the Church connect with God and each other and assist us to be renewed and reinvigorated in faith and sent out into the world to live the love of God. They are in some way worship. However, if this is the majority of what we think worship is, and most of our worship is focused, centred and predominantly expressed in our 'worship services' then we have missed the core message of the Gospel which Jesus proclaimed, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:15)

Our English word, 'worship' is derived from the Old English weorthscipe which means 'worthiness, acknowledgement of worth.' If we truly want to acknowledge the worth of God and express God's worthiness in our lives then it gets down to loving God with all our being all the time and this is best express, at least according to Jesus who was God incarnate, as loving our neighbour as ourselves. This is our true and deepest worship. Gathering is important for us to service our worship by reconnecting with God and God's mission, but it is the joining in God's mission and living faithfully which is how we demonstrate our being as the temple of God.

Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house.

In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

- Matthew 5: 13-16

Have we put our light into a box in understanding worship as our Church services? Have we lost our saltiness as the Body of Christ, or are we losing it? Have put God back into a temple instead of being the temple and coming to worship God in all we do and say? Do people look at us, the Church, and see our good deeds and glorify God, or do they see a bunch of people stuck in a temple-like building showing religion to be somewhat irrelevant and disconnected with their living? There is a lot of somethings to think about here.

For 20 consecutive years just before the end of term 1, the Gordon Uniting Church building has been transformed into Jerusalem 2000 years ago. The place comes alive with people from ancient times telling the story of Jesus' last week on earth, in a production called "The Easter Experience".

We invite Year 4 children from local schools to come and experience this important story in an interactive way. In addition we run a Year 7 program in the afternoon, challenging the students to look at the Easter story in a new way, relevant to today.



The Easter Experience is staged each year with volunteer actors from our congregation and others. For many children it is their first experience of the Easter story, and they walk through the scenes of The Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Trial of Jesus in the courtroom scene, and then experience the impact of the empty tomb, with Jesus re-appearing to assure them that he is alive.
