

Hosanna. Hosanna in the Highest

What do you think that hosanna means? Growing up, I thought that it meant something like hallelujah and had to do with praising God. Now, I know that it does and it doesn't. It literally has nothing to do with praising God. It literally - that is what it literally means in Hebrew - has nothing to do with praise, but is an asking God or someone else to save us. However, even though the word doesn't actually mean anything other than 'save us we pray', it has come to be used as a way of praising God who saves us, with the notion that our praise is rightly due because of that. So, I have done a bit of researching to work out why what something once meant has become to mean something completely different.

The video basically sums up what the Encyclopedia Britannica explains. "Hosanna, in modern speech and liturgical usage, a cry of praise to God. It has acquired this meaning through the assumption that it was so meant by the multitude

that hailed Jesus on Palm Sunday (Mark 11:9). If it was, it must already have become a Jewish liturgical cry rather far removed from its original meaning—the word is a Greek transliteration of the Hebrew hôshî 'ah-nna' "Save, (we) beseech Thee!" It meant, thus, entreaty, not praise (as in Psalms 118:25). If the crowd still knew its original meaning, they must have been addressing it to Jesus as the new David, as a plea for political salvation." https://www.britannica.com/topic/Hosanna

Wikipedia, tells us what is pointed out in the video, "The word hosanna (Latin osanna, Greek ὑσαννά, hōsanná) is from Hebrew hōšî ʿâ-nā and related to Aramaic ') הֹיִשִּׁיעָה יַּה (Ōsha ʿnā) meaning 'save, rescue, saviour'. In the Hebrew Bible it is used only in verses such as "help" or "save, I pray" (Psalms 118:25)." https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/

Similarly, Christianity.com explains, that Hosanna is often translated "Please Save Us." It is a Greek word "ὑσαννά" that most scholars believe is the transliteration of two Hebrew words- יָשַׁע- "yasha" which means "to save or <mark>deliver" and – אָנאָ"anna"</mark> which means "please, I beseech." Other scholars believe its Hebrew roots come from a different verb tense of "yasha" אהוֹשֵּע which means to cause or to bring about salvation. In this tense, hosanna becomes a command bring about or cause salvation. Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest continued

There is a lot about this word that I took for granted for so long. At its roots it is a cry for salvation. The people may have been praising Jesus as he came into Jerusalem, but they may also have been calling and beseeching him to save them from the Romans and become king of a free Israel. Today, we might say that it is about us understanding our need for salvation for our sins, especially if we have a cross/Easter focus. Certainly, Christ died for our sins and is the 'King of Salvation.' Yet, even if we do want to cry for God to save us from our sin, what are we meaning by that? Is Jesus, as the person of God whom we relate to as human, just there to mount some spiritual offensive to drive out the devil and sin from our lives? That is a nice idea, but on closer reflection are we missing the deeper meaning like the crowd did. Jesus didn't come to raise rebellion and drive out the Romans through war and fighting. Somewhat. similarly, Jesus didn't come to drive out sin and the work of hell in us through miraculous spiritual warfare.

The cross is the focus. It is about self-sacrifice and humility. It is about death and resurrection. This makes repentance and being saved from sin a work of discipline and discipleship in our lives. We are of course saved by grace. God simply wipes our sin away and remembers it no more. We don't earn forgiveness. We don't work for it. It is never owed to us. Neither is it dependent, even, on us asking for it, for whilst we were still sinners Christ died for us and on the cross beseeched God to forgive us because we don't know what we are doing. We are forgiven by God through grace. However, the work for us is repentance and to stop sinning because as 1 John 3: 6 states provocatively, "No one who lives in him keeps on sinning. No one who continues to sin has either seen him or known him." Yet, we know that we all do continue to sin. This is where we need to step out of the crowd. We need to rediscover the heart of hosanna.

Hosanna is a prayerful plea to God for help. It is rooted in the knowledge of the truth that we need God's help. It is rooted in the need for repentance, not only repentance of the mind, but repentance of the heart. We need help in changing our being. We need God's help to save us from ourselves and the continuing poor choosing that we do. Hosanna is at the heart of Lent, even though the recollection of it comes towards the end of this liturgical season. Hosanna is a liturgical term, but it is not just a nice old word to sing or say. It sets for us work as people to put effort and will to joining with God and opening ourselves so that God can work transformation and salvation in us. Despite us accepting God and claiming to be God's people, salvation is an ongoing process. As the old song 'Father Welcomes All His People' goes, "Let us daily die to sin. Let us daily rise with him." Hosanna leads us to the cross. In faith we enter not only the story of Easter, but we enter into death and resurrection as we seek to both die to sin, losing our lives which are not full of eternal living, and then being raised to eternal life, being born again in the grace and love of God. Hosanna is so much a word and idea to think about.
