## Something to think about



# 5th Sunday after Pentecost

## **Lectionary Readings:**

1 Samuel 17: 32-49 Psalm 9:9-20 2 Corinthians 6:1-13 Mark 4:35-41

#### Hope, Faith, God and Church

In the Gospel reading fear rears its scary head. The disciples are afraid that they are going to die. Jesus calms the storm and then rebukes ""Why are you them by saying, afraid? Have you still no faith?" At this the disciples are still afraid. Some translations soften it by saying that the disciples were full of awe, but the Greek text makes it doubly clear that they were afraid when it states, "... and they feared and with great fear 'Who is this they were saying, man?" (Mark 4:41).

What does it mean to fear Jesus or at least be fearful of him? We hear about the fear of the LORD being the beginning of wisdom in such things as Proverbs 9:10. Yet, that use of 'fear' is more about awe than being afraid. The disciples were, though, actually afraid. Is fear a right response to God in the person of Jesus?

We might put down the fear of the disciples to being more ancient and simpler in their worldview. However, to have the raw power of God on show may in fact still be frightening to us today. Perhaps, the disciples were fearful of what they had got themselves into. They were following this wise teacher who could do miracles, but to still a storm is next level stuff. Maybe they were in that moment afraid of where all this might lead.

On 22 June the Uniting Church celebrates/ed its 47<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. We who are members of the Uniting Church have pledged ourselves to God in the person of Jesus. At our inauguration in 1977 the Uniting Church published large advertisements in the major newspapers which "Statement to presented a the Nation." You can read about this and read the statement on the Uniting Church Assembly website using this https://uniting.church/a-justicelink. oriented-church/

The 'Statement to the Nation' is not a statement of doctrine in terms of theology. That kind of statement is found in 'The Basis of Union' which you can find link https:// using this uniting.church/basisofunion. The Statement to the Nation' is a statement of vision and a commitment to guiding principles and where that should take us as the Church. It is actually an amazing piece and very forward thinking. It concludes with the words, "We pledge ourselves to hope and work for a nation whose goals are not guided by self-interest alone, but by concern for the welfare of all persons everywhere — the family of the One God — the God made known in Jesus of Nazareth the One who gave His life for others. In the spirit of His self-giving love we seek to go forward." Hopefully we still are committed to following God in this way. Yet, this is a bit scary.

#### Hope, Faith, God and Church Continued

Forty-seven years later, a lot about the Church has changed. We don't hold the dominant place in society which we once enjoyed. We have seen significant decline in attendance and are still seeing a decline in participation in Church by many in our younger generations. In this there is some fear for our future. This is not fear of God, but a fear for God and the lack of people's valuing of a relationship with God – at least as expressed through formal, institutional. traditional forms of Church. Of course it is not all doom and gloom and there are many, many exciting things happening in the Church and great examples where trends of decline are being broken.

How then does fear of Jesus, fit in all this? Many of our congregations are doing things as they have done since Union. Many of our services and buildings which hold them look largely the same, although some of the music, exteriors and interiors have had some freshening up. In all the time I have spent in the Uniting Church (which is close to 42 years) I have not seen in the several congregations that I have been a part of I'm afraid that I have not seen a lot of the vision of the Statement of the Nation being prioritised. Certainly, in the wider Church I see evidence of the Statement being lived out, but in most of the congregations I have been a part of or have had connection with, most of the focus has been on Sunday services as Worship, with some secondary attention to Bible studies, home groups and other activities. I realise that I am grossly oversimplifying and that many congregation do much more (even the ones I have had connection with). Yet, in being deliberately provocative in order to get us thinking about our priorities, I can't help wondering if we are sometimes afraid to commit to Jesus at that level described in the Statement to the Nation.

There is the chance that the Uniting Church got it wrong back in 1977. However, some will argue that the decline in participation in Church can be correlated with our failure to engage as a whole people of God in much of which is described in the Statement to the Nation. Have too many of us fallen victim to the temptation of a pax perniciosa - a dangerous peace of mind which keeps us feeling separate and superior instead of connected and compassionate? Have we dulled the edge of the Gospel that Jesus preached and forgotten awe, and maybe even a little fear at how mindbending is the Kingdom of God and how we are called to participate in its building? Maybe Jesus might be asking us in our comfortable churches, "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" As the Church, the people of God, the Body of Christ, maybe we should revisit the Statement to the Nation and take up its challenge. Maybe we should reaffirm the commitment and, "pledge ourselves to hope and work for a nation whose goals are not guided by self-interest alone, but by concern for the welfare of all persons everywhere — the family of the One God — the God made known in Jesus of Nazareth the One who gave His life for others. In the spirit of His self-giving love we seek to go forward." Anyway, there is a lot we can think about.
