Theologically Diversity

I am a theological mongrel. A mongrel is something or someone who is of no identifiable type or breed, being a mix of a range of things. Theological mongrelism is about not fitting into any set or established boxes or delineations. It is about not defining ourselves into types or brands or tribes. In my faith journey I have attended different denominations and been part of different fellowship groups with roots in different traditions. At theological college I learnt about many different streams of understanding and ways of knowing God and different ways of interpreting and understanding the Bible. In the end I have found that I have not settled into any tribe or team or theological faction. I'm progressively conservative and conservatively progressive. I'm post-evangelical, if I was ever truly evangelical, but value what I learnt and how I was formed in evangelicalism.

I appreciate liberal theology and liberation theology. I have been stretched and challenged by feminist and queer theology. I have explored a range of spiritual practices, including such things as Taizé services, and Christian meditation.

In a world of increasing factionalism and tribalism (or a resurgence of such things), where people often look to aligning with a particular theological orientation or group, being a theological mongrel means that I am a curiosity. This is not sometimes seen as a good thing. Curiosity is a word many of us think that we are familiar with. Many of us will think of inquiry, fascination and wonder When we hear the word 'curiosity.' Yet, it once carried the meaning of paying careful attention to detail. This older meaning fits with our modern understanding in that if we are being inquisitive and curious then we should pay attention to detail.

However, when we describe something as a curiosity then for many that carries a sense of unusuality or weirdness.

Curiosities were often freakish. People in seeing others as curiosities focused on differences and used such terms as oddities. What people paid attention to was that which placed the oddity outside of normal. This is a sad reality, but maybe we can reclaim a positive aspect of curiosity and curiosities. We can stretch our understanding of who we are to be welcoming and inclusive of difference, paying attention to our differences but not seeing them as oddities, and just seeing them as part of the fullness of our complexity as a diverse community. 
Maybe it is just due to how I have just described myself, but I see Jesus as a true curiosity. Jesus was God incarnate, and the way he presented God through example and teaching was outside of the bounds of his faith traditions. Ironically, if we pay careful attention to him and his way, then we might find that we are often viewing him as an oddity, or at least we might find that we are out of step with his view of religion and the Kingdom of God. We need to be curious about Jesus and pay careful attention to our biases and theological prejudices. Otherwise, we will simply see Jesus in the way that we want him to be.

The Reverend Doctor Clive Pearson taught me theology and introduced me to the idea of theological allies and aliens. Theological allies are those who hold similar ideas and theology to us or are from our general theological tradition. Theological aliens are those whose theology seems alien or strange to us, being very much outside the bounds of our understanding of theology. Clive encouraged us to explore and attend to the thinking of theological aliens, and to do it with curiosity and an absence of hostility.

Learning what our theological aliens understand about God and why they think that way doesn't mean that we have to accept their ideas or change ours. However, when we pay the ideas of others some attention with curiosity and care to detail then, together, we are made richer in our knowing of God.

In this season of After
Pentecost where we have
a liturgical focus on
growth in understanding,
discipleship and ministry,
it is good to grow in our
theological understanding.
I challenge us all to be
theologically
compassionate and to be
curious about those who
may be theologically alien
to us or ideas which may
be theologically alien to us.

It is good to develop our own sense of who we say God is as we journey in faith into understanding. It is good to settle on certain themes or core truths which we build our theology around. However, let us not become too comfortable within the bounds of our understanding, lest we inadvertently put God in boxes of our making. Let us also remember that we are called to the ministry of reconciliation by Christ, who is God incarnate, and part of that ministry is a call to unity in our diversity and being able to reconcile different ideas about God and the people who hold them into the one Body of Christ, one people of God, and one Church. A little theological alien encounter is thus, something to consider

From St. Matthew's Finance Committee:

Update on the Roof loan repayments:

We have two loans for the roof, the Schofields Loan and the Uniting Financial Services Loan (UFS).

The original amount of the Schofields loan was \$50,000.

This loan commenced on 19th September 2022. The balance of the amount owing as at 11th June 2024 is \$41,838.98. So far the Church has repaid \$8,161.02 from the Schofield Loan. The current repayments are \$427.26 per month.

The original amount of the UFS loan was \$150,000. The balance of the UFS loan is \$117,316.12, as at 11th June 2024. It has an offset account with a balance of \$125,000, of which \$100,000 is a loan from a kind congregant and \$25,000 is what we have put aside from the church funds, roof donations and fundraising. This means that we are saving on paying interest on the UFS loan and as a result we are paying down the principal more quickly than originally anticipated. Although the offset account exceeds the Church loan balance, we typically pay approximately \$70-80 per month interest which equates to a reduction in the principal of approximately \$900 per month. So far we have paid off \$32,683.88 from the UFS loan. The Church pays \$977.18 per month off this loan.

In the last financial year (22/23), the total of roof donations and fundraising was \$7,211. So far in this financial year (23/24) the amount received from donations and fundraising is \$4,327.

We would like to thank the St. Matthew's community for their continued support and for their donations towards the roof.

St. Matthew's Annual General Meeting:

The Finance Committee will be presenting the 2024/25 Church Budget at the church **AGM** that will be held on **18**th **August 2024**, there will be one **combined morning service at 9am** and the AGM will be held after the service.



Op-Shop Report ... July 2024 ...

St. Matthew's Uniting Church Op-shop Baulkham Hills has been operating since the late 1990's. It started with an acknowledgment that despite being an affluent area, there were many people living locally who were struggling financially. Clothing donations was always sorted carefully, and only the best quality items kept. The rest was re-donated to be made into rags. The price of clothing was kept low because the intention was to offer help to the community rather than fund raising. Customers became friends, with many coming in regularly for a chat.

Over time we have expanded from a couple of trestle tables piled with clothing to proper hanging racks and display cabinets for 'treasures'. We open from 9am to 2pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and the first Saturday of each month when we hold a garage sale as well as the Op-shop. Almost thirty people give their time to ensure everything runs smoothly and efficiently.

The mission has not changed however; we still offer low cost clothing, a friendly greeting and





a chat, and prayer for ailments or family members, relying on the Spirit to lead us.

The volunteers recently decided to run a Bridal Expo after being given 5 brand new wedding dresses. We advertised our intentions to the congregation and received many more beautiful dresses, shoes, handbags and accessories. We collected some good quality evening wear and men's wear to makeup the display, and took over one of the church halls to set up a display. One of our customers kindly donated a lot of time to help with marketing and display organisation. The whole event was a team effort and well received by the public. Ladies seemed to enjoy the idea of coming into an area with' special' clothing and trying on some gorgeous dresses. We extended the event to three consecutive Saturdays to cater for women who work during the week, and the staff all dressed in black for fun.

Next month we will be holding a morning tea for our customers on a Saturday morning. The idea is to create an environment where we can all sit with a coffee and biscuit and share stories.

We are fortunate to be able to support some local companies and individuals, including Parramatta Mission, a lady providing clothing to Ukraine refugees, a lady fostering 'seeing-eye' puppies, and a lady supporting a village, school and hospital in the Philippines. Donations of clothing, blankets, towels (for the puppies), school and hygiene supplies are collected and placed in storage waiting to be collected.

Working in an op-shop is tremendous fun, with many laughs and friendships made. One volunteers recently said: if you told someone you were meeting a group of friends every week for coffee AND lunch, they would they would not believe you, but we do.
