

# Something to think about 20th October 22nd Sunday after Pentecost

#### **Lectionary Readings:**

Job 38:1-7, (34-41) Psalm 104:1-9, 24, 35c Hebrews 5:1-10 Mark 10:35-45

### **Caring About Caring**

In a talk by Lawrence Freeman which we recently listened to as part of our Monday night Christian Meditation group, he raised the issue about the complexity of care. In English there are so many nuances or interpretations or applications of this seemingly simple word. We can care. We have cares. We care. There is carelessness and uncaring which is very different from being care-free. To say to someone, "Have a care!" is very different to telling them to take care. To take care is similar, but different to taking care of someone or something. This complexity of meaning was not something that I'd cared to explore in much detail or care enough about to take time to ponder it before. So, here we go with a mind bending and thought-twisting exploration of care as part of faith and discipleship.

The Bible is a book full of wisdom if we care to listen for it and discern what that wisdom of God might be. This is the important thing. It is the wisdom of God that we should care about not human wisdom. As the writer of 1 Corinthians asks us, "Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?" [1 Corinthians 1: 20]. If we care to ask God for wisdom, then God will gift it to us. The writer of James states this clearly when he writes, "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you." [James 1:5] What is then the wisdom we should care for?

The Revised Common Lectionary has been tracking through the book of Job in the Old Testament readings which is set as part of it. This isn't something that we have been exploring in our services at this time but it good to touch upon, and this reflection is an opportunity to do so. The book of Job seems to be about the wisdom of care. Job cares for God. The Satan suspects that Job only cares because he has much wealth and many good things in his life. So, Job has all these things taken away, and on top of all this tragedy, he is afflicted with horrible disease which makes his life even more miserable.

Many see the book of Job to be about seeking wisdom around the issue of why bad things happen to good people, or why a good God allows suffering, which most of us would judge as being bad. In the book, it is clear that God cares for Job. His friends seem to care for Job but, in the end, they seem more to care about defending God than caring about Job or caring for Job. Job cares to challenge God and ask, "Why?" It is then that things dive into deep philosophical and theological areas, if they weren't doing so enough already.

What God cares about and how God cares for us seems as complex at times as the meaning and uses of the word care. Job questioned whether or not God cared about justice. God challenged Job to care to consider the complexity of creation and the depth of justice or the consequences of dealing justice in the way Job cared about. God also calls us to care about what we care about and this is a key theme in Scripture.

As followers of God who we know in the person of the Christ and who speaks wisdom to us as Spirit we should take care in relation to what we care about and how we care for others. The commandments, Jesus's exhortation that the greatest focus we can have in life is to love God with our whole being and do the same by loving our neighbours as ourselves, all the prophetic teachings of the prophets such as Micah 6: 6-8 and much of the teachings of Paul and the other writers of the Epistles, all often have a strong leaning to speak about what God cares about and therefore what we should care about if we care about God. They also speak to how we should go about being caring as we seek to embody the love and will of God.

What do we really care about and how is that different to what we care for, as opposed to who we care for? We may not care for, that is feel like or want to, care for others in the way God call us to, but if we care about God then we should care about what God cares about and go about caring for those whom God cares for. Maybe we need a better word than 'care.' Yet, it is the word that we have and so it is the one we seek to better understand. If we have cares and worries, do not others have such things too? If we care about the instruction from Jesus to do for others what we would have them do for us. then we should care about their cares just as much as they should care for ours. When we care for each other then we create a carina community which is a bringing the Kingdom of God nearer and realer into being.

We who are the Church should be a community of care. It is what we are called to be. We are called to care about what we think about. We are called to care about who we care about. We are called to care about the way that we go about caring. We care called to care to make priorities in life as part of our faith and discipleship as we care to love God and those whom God cares about, which includes ourselves. Caring is a very complicated idea. It has many nuances and layers of meaning, but is also central to who we are as we seek to bear the image of God. So, apologies for my overuse of the word, but thinking about what we care about is most definitely something to care to think about.
