Something to think about

3rd November 24th Sunday after Pentecost

Lectionary Readings:

Ruth 1:1-18 Psalm 146 **Hebrews 9:11-14 Mark 12:28-34**

Inhabit

In Christ we are free. There is no 'but' to this truth, but there is. The reality is that we are constrained in many ways, not so much by God, but by the habits and strictures of culture, religion, society etc. I was pondering the weird word inhabit. It doesn't' seem weird at first. Yet, the more that we dig into it, the stranger it becomes. My understanding of the word was that it is about in live in a place where we are. However, I noticed for the first time that the word was in essence composed of "in' and 'habit.' Being in a habit can be both positive and negative depending on the outcome the habit has in our life, and habits certainly shape the pattern of our lives.

The etymology of inhabit seems to go back to the Latin inhabitare which is comprised of 'in' meaning in and 'habitare' meaning to dwell. So, inhabitare literally means to dwell in. Yet, there seems to be an older and deeper root which is habere which means to hold or have. However, there is an even deeper root which relates to the word 'have' which is ghabh, also be ghebh, which is a proto-Indo-European word with the root meaning "to give or receive." Here having seems linked with giving and receiving or offering and accepting. There appears to have been a selfish flip in understanding of inhabit from giving and offering to being about holding and having at some stage.

Habitat is often understood to be the place where we live or can live.
Habitation is the act of living in a place.
A habitat is a place which holds a certain collection of conditions for an organism or organisms to live. Here the conditions offer and shape how the organisms can find life and therefore shapes the way that they live. Again, this meaning istruer to the root of what is given or offered rather than what is held or possessed.

Sadly, too often, like how the understanding of the word has evolved, we understand inhabiting to be about possessing. We are in the habit of thinking about what we hold and own and, by implication, what we control in relation to a place. Our habit of living in the world is too often more about taking and making than receiving and accepting.

Yet, in all this is choice. Habits are formed. They aren't innate. We develop them over time through repeated behaviours. They become habits as they are neuroplastically hard-wired into our brains as the repetitions shape neural patterns and pathways. Once formed, they usually take a lot of work and effort to change. We should therefore take great care of what habits we take hold of. Our habits of mind become mindsets and our mindsets and habits of mind lead us into habits of behaviour.

Over the past year we have heard that God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them. [1 John 4: 16) This is about our habitation and God's habitation as Spirit with us or within us. In Jesus' response to a scribe as to what the greatest commandment is in Mark 12:28-34 Jesus centres our thinking and doing to be about love. We should love God with all our being and we should love our neighbour as ourselves. Commandments are about setting a moral framework in our minds which should guide our living. Here Jesus links loving God with loving others as we ourselves are loved. This is set as to what should be our deepest and most ingrained habit. It should shape all our living.

So, we inhabit spaces and times. In those spaces and times we establish patterns of behaviour and living which we call habits. Rather than just thinking that to inhabit something is to take and own it or to have and hold it, as part of our faith in God and our spirituality and discipleship, we are challenged to explore what life in any certain place or time, in any certain situation or circumstance, and with any certain people and relationships might offer to us and shape our living. We are called to be mindful that God inhabits our living, and that offers us a different way of being. We are called to take up habits of love which are about self-giving and the offering of our gifts in service to others rather than habits of consuming and using others and things for our own self-interest.

Jesus, who is God with us, opens a different understanding of life to that of our consumeristic, capitalistic society and culture. He radically shifts things back to the root understanding of being where there is a synergy between giving and receiving and offering and taking. Jesus, who is God as Word, calls us to hold onto and inhabit a way of being which is centred and focused on sacrificial and other-serving not self-serving lust for more and for comfort. When we live in love we live in God and God lives in us. This is a habit worth thinking about and taking up.



LECTIONARY READINGS

On Tuesday 22 October we had our first **Weekly Bible study**. Although the turnout was small in number we covered quite a lot. We explored the Revised Common Lectionary readings set for last Sunday, 20 October 2023.

We covered such topics as who was Melchizedek? We sought to better understand the book of Job and how it deals with the problem of suffering. We explored what priesthood meant in the Bible, how Jesus was our Great High Priest, and related it to how we are all part of the priesthood of all believers.

And, if that wasn't quite an achievement, we also thought about how the sacrifice of Jesus, as the Son of God and the incarnation of God related to the idea of ransom which is mentioned by Jesus in Mark 10 45, also managing to touch on the story of Abraham - which sort of brought us full circle.

The aim of this series of Bible studies is to allow people to shape what we learn about by suggesting questions and what they would like to understand better, as we look for links between the set readings and what might have been covered in the sermon the previous Sunday.
