# **Epiphany 5**

#### Lectionary Readings:

Isaiah 6:1-8, (9-13) Psalm 138 1 Corinthians 15:1-11 Luke 5:1-11

## Woe to Me I Am Someone of Unclean Lips

We like the idea of truth, but most of us have not truly encountered it and know it mostly as a philosophical concept or theological doctrines. The truth of God, at least as we hear about it in the Bible is not an easy thing. It is piercing of our souls when we encounter it, and it confronts us with the fullness of our being in ways which we would prefer not to encounter.

In our readings set in the Revised Common Lectionary this week, we have examples of people who have encountered the truth in the Prophet Isaiah and in the Apostle Paul. Both experienced the truth and how it both humbled them but also called them to be something new as they joined in God's mission.

In the Isaiah 6 reading, the prophet encounters a vision of God. In the presence of God, with the heavenly hosts declaring the holiness of God and the nature of God's glory, the prophet experiences the conviction of truth. The experience is so powerful that he cries out, "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips." (Isaiah 6:8) This is the true awe-full fear of God, which is not fearfulness or being afraid of God, but is being humbled in reality of being. We seek to emulate this experience in our Church services as we come and offer praise and thanksgiving as we try to connect with the presence of God. We do have times of confession, but most of us would admit that in our prayers of confession that we are not experiencing anything coming close to the degree that Isaiah is. We do offer prayers of confession, but much of the time whilst we know in our heads that we sin and fall short of the glory of God, we don't always know it in our hearts and our prayers can sometimes be more lip service than true experiences of metanoia and repentance.

Last week I attended the Future Church conference and there was a session on the future of the Church is that we will be anti-racist. This is an uncomfortable topic, especially as I am a White, middle-class, educated male. I am very privileged with the gifts of my upbringing such as a loving family and good public school education, but I am not always aware of the inherent privilege this birth-effect is accorded to me in a society which is biased towards those of my kind and living in the socioeconomic area which I was raised and in fact haven't moved to far from. Baulkham Hills, although the socioeconomic profile is changing, as is the culture and racial demographic, is still similarly privileged to Anglo-Celtic culture. This privilege has a shadow side where those outside the dominant race and culture do not experience the same privilege, and in fact are often disadvantaged. This can be an expression of what I am learning is named as aversive racism.

In a work by Sarah Trembath, she identifies that aversive racism is unintentional in that perpetrators don't feel they have its prejudices or are acting out of them and often self-describe as liberal and without racial bias (Gaertner and Dovidio). But yet they hold deep within them aversions -strong feelings of "dislike, opposition, repugnance, or antipathy"- to people of certain racial or ethnic groups. The key distinction in this term has to do with averting, a "turning away or preventing." However, even those of us who may not believe that we hold a dislike or antipathy towards people of other races or cultures, we often fail to be proactive in our love for them as neighbour and participate in systems which uphold inequity, or which reinforce the privilege of the dominant culture in society. Even when we recognise that we are part of prejudiced which disenfranchise. society systems debilitate and devalue the humanhood of others and their ability to access equality of opportunity in our society, or recognise instances external to us where this is happening, we too often do not do anything to challenge it.

Aversive racism is the term that was used in psychologist Joel Kovel's pivotal White Racism: A Psychohistobook, ry (1970). This title might make those of us who are white uncomfortable, and we may find ourselves becoming angry or defensive. Noone like to be judged or accused of injustice or wrongdoing which we don't believe ourselves to be guilty of. However, if we take up the elements of love which we read about in 1 Corinthians 13: 4-7 and the fruit of the Spirit and practise a modicum of patience and a submission to the truth, we might learn some things which we might come to accept as being valid.

Subsequent researchers on the phenomenon of aversive racism found, across many studies, that many people in the dominant cultures and race in countries like Australia, USA and Great Britain, were in practice biased against people of other race and culture and failed to assist them, or uphold equitable opportunities for them, while still seeing themselves as holding egalitarian values (Gaertner and Dovidio). "Conscious values and unconscious negative feelings" operate simultaneously in the aversive racist (Gaertner and Dovidio). Even though their acts may seem subtle, passive, or at least hard to detect, they often have the same effect on their target that more overt forms of racism do. They may be unintentional but the result for those experiencing them are the same.

Part of my calling to St. Matthew's, as expressed by the Join Nominating Committee (JNC), was a desire to help reach out in life and witness to an increasingly diverse local community. As the people of God, who know God in the person of Jesus, the Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life, (John 14:6) we know we are called to love our neighbour as ourselves (Leviticus 19:18, Matthew 22:39 and Mark 12:31). We are called to live and love better and to enter into repentance when we come to understand that we are falling short of the glory of God. Part of our metanoia (changing of heart and mind) as a congregation as we look to better engage in ministry in our community as part of the mission of God, is to acknowledge in confession that we do have elements of systemic and aversive racism subtly and unintentionally woven through our life as a Church.

I regularly have to face the fact that, whether I like it or not, participation in systemic and aversive racism is a part of Australian society. Recent comments by The Honourable Susan Ley, deputy leader of the Liberal Party and Deputy Leader of the Opposition, member of parliament for the New South Wales seat of Farrer, about Australia Day and her biased understanding of British settlement confirm for me that I can, like Isaiah, confess that, I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips. I am not seeking to be party-political, for the Labour Government has many flaws and failings too. However, God calls us to justice, mercy and loving-kindness and to walk humbly as we love our neighbour as ourselves. The good news is that God calls us to be part of the solution even if we might be part of the problem, or perhaps because we are. God restores us in grace to right living. Like the prophet, I hear the "voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" (Isaiah 6:8)

Are we racist? Most of us would want to say, "No, I don't believe that I am." However, are we actively anti-racism? Most of us, if we are truly honest, would likely answer the same. How we not only tolerate, but welcome, accept, honour and celebrate all people, especially those of other culture and race, as a welcoming congregation of the People of God as an essential part of our life and witness is something to truly think about.




