Something to think about

23rd February Epiphany 7

Lectionary Readings:

So, a Young Person Walks into Church?

Most of us who have been in the Church for a while probably rejoice when a young person walks into our Church space. Many of us pray that this would be a common occurrence, and that they would not simply visit but stay and become part of the community. However, there will be some of us who welcome this kind of happening but don't always know what to do, or feel comfortable about what to do, when it happens.

David Toogood, Education and Resourcing Facilitator – for Pulse, the Synod Youth Ministry Growth team, presented a master class on this topic this week. Uniting Mission and Education has established these master classes, not so much as lectures, but as free online monthly forums designed to support active ministry leaders by exploring contemporary perspectives and fostering networks of support and collaboration. Ministry Masterclasses seek to provide input and support for people who are keen to build networks and gain new insights from thought leaders.

As I write this on Tuesday morning, I haven't yet joined in the masterclass which is to be held in the afternoon. So, I am not sure what will be shared, but the program has a summary of what David will speak about, and he asks the following questions about a person's experience in joining with a Church: Is it safe? Is Jesus in the centre? Is it fun? Now I don't yet know how David will presentation shape his around questions, but I thought that they were worth considering. You can ask me when you see me about what he actually presented.

I don't know what David will present, but I agree that they are good and important questions to consider, it is worth doing some thinking about. The first question, "Is it safe?" does refer to physical safety, but safety goes much deeper than that. Safety for young people as it is for all of us is also about psychological, emotional, spiritual and theological safety. Anyone coming to be part of the Church or our activities should not experience any kind of abuse. We should be fully living out the Fruit of the Spirit [love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, generosity and faithfulness and self-control]. We should be a community of love, which has all the marks of love that the Apostle Paul describes in 1 Corinthians 13. People should be safe to exercise and explore who they are, as they are, how they are and what they are without comment or criticism, but with acceptance and welcome and human-kindness as we seek to join in community with each other in mutual respect, love and commonality of being people cared for by God.

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When David, asks, "Is Jesus at the centre?" there are many ways we can understand that. We are the Body of Christ, who was Jesus – Immanuel: God with us. Thus, if we are not living as disciples and a community whose life is centred on joining in the work of God, which Christ as the Word of God, announced as helping break open this world to the Kingdom of God and its communion of the common good, then Jesus is not at the centre. So, the teachings of Jesus should be at the centre and we should be honouring in the way we live the commandment to love God with all our being and to love our neighbour as ourselves and as we go about doing this, to disciple others, baptising them, that is plunging them into the faith and family of Jesus/God, and teaching them all Jesus commanded. However, God is also present with us and within us as Spirit, and thus we cannot be the Church, who seeks to be the body of Christ, without using our gifts given to us as God as Spirit in ministry of loving service to other as per the example of Jesus.

Finally comes the question of 'fun.' Many have challenged me over the years when I have sought to make faith and discipleship fun, even despite all the exhortations in Scripture to "rejoice in the Lord" and make a iovful noise to God. It seems that if things are fun, then people feel that we are not taking faith and discipleship seriously or seriously enough. I would argue that the opposite is true. We know that joy is a powerful emotion. We know that we want people to have a positive experience of being part of the Church, and fun plays a part in that. Church should be seriously fun - that is not just frivolous for frivolity's sake, but fun in the way that we feel engaged and motivated. Shared fun provides a powerful shared experience which creates a greater sense of community and develops relationships and connections. We know this because it is a key part of friendships, especially for young people. We also know that memory is very much linked to our emotions. So, fun seriously helps people learn and remember what they have learnt. If we are disciples and seek to learn and help others learn about God and faith and discipleship, then fun has its place amongst other helpful emotions.

Sadly, strong negative emotions also lock things in our memory. If people, especially young people, who may not have the life experience or developed sense of self and self-esteem which helps them be resilient, come to Church and have a strongly negative experience, where they do not feel welcomed or accepted for who they are and who they are becoming, or worse experience harm or hurt then they may be turned off faith for life. Noone should experience abuse in any form, but neither should they experience discrimination, judgement, hypocrisy, or condemnation. unacceptance other aspects of negative, unhelpful and hurtful behaviour that the Church is sadly too often known for.

Whilst we might consider ourselves to be welcoming and in no way like that kind of negative space, we should dodge the questions, and if our answer to the questions to be, yes, our Church is safe, it is Christ/Jesus/God/Spirit-centred we need to be able to also answer and give evidence how we know, and that it is not mostly safe and mostly Christ-centred and mostly welcoming. For anyone who walks into our space they should encounter the grace and love and mercy and blessing etc of God, and not just from some of our members but from all of us, and not just some of the time but all of the time.

When a young person walks into our community as the Church, whether they are here for the first time or a member of it, we should be asking ourselves: Is it safe? Is Jesus in the centre? Is it fun? This gives us something to continually think about.

Join Us for the First 2025 Missional Reading Group!




