# The Edge of Faith

Last week in the newsletter I wrote about the idea that faith leads us into both/and thinking more often than either/or thinking. This week in the readings, especially in the Gospel reading, which has the Parable of the Unfruitful Fig tree, we are reminded about not being complacent in our faith. Faith has an edge. It is meant to cut into complacency and apathy in our life and carve out greater space for God in our hearts, minds, souls and living. The Parable of the Unfruitful Fig Tree is a reminder that Jesus wasn't always gentle, meek and mild. The faith of Jesus has an edge which we need to mindful of. As Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 10: 12, "So, if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall."

The fig tree is cursed because it fails to bear fruit. Other than figs (which might naturally come to mind having mentioned a fig tree) when you hear the word 'fruit' in a faith context what comes to mind? What stories, teachings or Bible passages come to mind about fruit? Take a moment to think about

that and maybe write some ideas down. Try not to read ahead at this point and just sit and do some of your own thinking and pull out from your memory things that might be lying there from your reading of the Bible and the times you have spent being a part of the Church.

There are over 60 mentions of fruit in the Bible. There are references to fruit in both the Jewish Scriptures/Old Testament and the New Testament. Feel free to Google them or use another search engine to look them up. As I think about fruit in the Bible, the Fruit of the Spirit comes to instantly to mind [Galatians 5:22-23]. For me it is obvious given the literal use of the word, "fruit". The second story that comes to mine is Jesus talking about being the vine and we the branches [John 15: 1-8]. What other ones come to mind?' What were the ones that you thought of or were things you discovered when you looked them up? When you think about these passages where do begin to hear or notice the edge, or how does it jump out and cut through your thinking?

The references about fruit in Jesus being the true vine and with the Fruit of the Spirit, just like the Parable of the Unfruitful Fig Tree, have an edge which cuts through to an understanding of the both/and nature of our discipleship. What do I mean by that? Well, it makes clear that we are both/and in terms of being on the right and wrong side of God's calling. The people of faith in the parable can be seen to be the fig tree, God being the owner and Christ being the gardener, or at least that is one interpretation that it is often described.

If this is so then, the axe lies at the foot of our trunk if we are not bearing fruit. Jesus in his talk about being the vine and we being the branches minces no words and leaves no room for ambiguity. He states, "If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned." So, we are part of Christ, but we should not take this for granted.

The edginess of these readings cut through our complacency. We are both saved, and we are also sinners. We are both part of Christ, being the branches of the vine as the Body of Christ, and we are those fruitless branches which, like the fig tree in the parable, stand at risk of being cut off or cut down. We live in grace but we should not take such grace for granted, and not out of fear, but out of sincere love and appreciation and out of a desire to bring God, who has one so much to save us and works so hard to redeem us, we should seek to honour God's love in gratitude through seeking to bring God glory through our good living and bearing good fruit.

So, to continue to be a bit edgy, do we give a fig (a saying meaning that we care and have a concern for something) about what God calls us to as Christ? If God is the Holy Spirit who dwells in us, are we bearing the fruit of God as Spirit, and is it healthy and plentifully evident in our lives or is it just a small fig of an offering? In the light of the

cutting edge of the Gospel let us, as Paul writes to the Philippians, work for good in faith and discipleship. He writes, "Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence but much more now in my absence, work on your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure. Do all things without murmuring and arguing, so that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, in which you shine like stars in the world." [Philippians 2:12-15]. However, let us not focus on fear, but in love and gratitude let us take up some of Paul's other encouragement. For he writes to the Church in Rome, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." [Romans 12:1-2] Having discerned what is good and acceptable, let us go about doing it.

What does giving a fig in faith look like for us, as we ponder the edginess of our faith? That is something to think about in Lent.


