# Resurrection is Not Happily Ever After

Resurrection is not happily ever after. Resurrection is a joyous reality which presents us with the power of transformation and redemption, not only of our souls but also of our hardships and suffering. However, resurrection is a difficult and painful process, at least as we read in the Scriptures. It does not miraculously return things to as they were. Jesus, as God with us, rises transfigured and transformed. He has scars and wounds which are a testament to his suffering. He brings peace, and grace and love, but also teaching, challenge and a calling.

Have you considered the pain of resurrection. In my convalescence and recovering from RSV, my thoughts about Easter have been less triumphant than in past years. This has been a blessing in some ways. It has taken me into the side of Easter which sometimes seems to get pushed aside in all the joyous celebrations.

Here is a prayer that I wrote as a reflection on what pain resurrection must have been for God.

# The Pain of Resurrection

What pain is there in resurrection!
In proclaiming you risen,
God who is Christ,
We too often assume in our joy that all is happy,
easy and well.

Easter Sunday passes.

We proclaim ecstatically that you are risen.

Yet, we seem to miss the point,

Ignore the story,

And overlook the detail.

Surely, there was pain in resurrection.

How does one come back to love those who strive to mortally wound your way,
And have not really changed;
Who still do not know what we do?
How much pain comes in the healing of wounds and the forming of scars?
What hurt is there to find not belief but disbelief.

And fear, mingled thickly with doubt running amuck?

What ache remains having done so much, to know that so much still has to be done? How sore the wounds of forgiveness must be: Those that will be made raw again and again and again in humanity's seeming ceaseless need for your grace?

And, there in your hands and feet and in your side are scars and wounds which have not gone away.

There is pain in resurrection.
There is hope and healing.
There is new life,
Sprung eternal.
Yet, there is pain.

Ask any who have passed through grief.
Ask any who have overcome injustice.
Ask any who have triumphed beyond abuse and suffering.

Resurrection is real and powerful.

It is potent and possible.

Yet, resurrection comes with pain.

The cross must be endured.

Death must be passed through.

All that was cannot be what is,

But what is, is more than can seem possibly to be.

Help us to understand,

And bear the pain of resurrection,

We pray. Amen.

Easter is a season of fifty days. It is not about happily ever after. It is a time of metamorphosis. It is a time where we hear stories of encounters with the risen Christ, but they are framed with the confusion, uncertainty, doubt and disbelief of the disciples. Each encounter seems to bring hope but also seems to present a challenge or a call. Slowly, the story builds up and more and more people encounter Jesus, that the sad and disheartened group of followers and disciples is slowly transmuted into what will be birthed as the Church at Pentecost. Here, we are reminded again that resurrection isn't happily ever after, but us just the next step on the way of the cross and the coming of the Kingdom of Heaven.



Resurrection is an important reality, but it is not the end of the story, nor is it the resolution of the narrative. In fact, resurrection leads to redemption of key characters, the opening of new possibilities, the beginning of the next phase of the mission of God, as the work of God as Spirit begins and the disciples are called and commissioned

to the taking on of the work of the one to whom they were discipled to. Christ ascends, the Spirit is released in us as the Church, and we are commissioned as the Body of Christ to help God continue to break through the Kingdom of Heaven. The work of the mission of God keeps unfolding.

So, here we are in Easter. It is not over. The eggs may be gone or going, but there is work to be done. We are Easter people and we have learning to do in resurrection. Resurrection is not happily ever after, but an important threshold in the way of the cross into entering the Kingdom of Heaven. We have work to do, a liturgy (work as the people) to prepare for what Pentecost will call us to. Easter is fifty days of readying to welcome anew the work of God as Spirit as we are called into ministry to join in the mission of God. What are we learning? How are we being changed by resurrection? What will be our calling? What is to come next? These are things to think about.



# Christian Life in the Light of Christian Meditation 1: Discipleship By Laurence Freeman OSB

# From the St Matthew's Social Issues Focus Group

## **Update on the report for the 2024 NSW Drug Summit:**

Uniting Fair Treatment have advised that the 2024 NSW Drug Summit report is available to the public. Email Amanda Manson if you would like a pdf of the report or you can search it in your internet browser.

The co-chairs have produced a list of 56 priority actions, grouped into 12 topics that they believe should be urgently implemented within the next 1-2 years. Additionally, they have asked for a response from Government within six months of the report's release. The first achievement of the 2024 Drug Summit is that a trial of drug testing has commenced in NSW.

Priority advocacy actions for Uniting Fair Treatment include:

- The removal of restrictions to the creation of new supervised injecting facilities
- Reform of the Early Drug Diversion Initiative (EDDI) to extend eligibility criteria
- Providing harm reduction training for first responders, equipping them with naloxone
- The creation of a 10 year whole-of-government alcohol and other drugs strategy

### Upcoming Events that members of St Matthews can participate in:

On Friday 2nd May 2025 'Hills March for Change' for raising awareness of domestic and family violence (DFV). Marchers assemble from around 6:30am under the covered area at the front of the entrance to the carpark nearest the Event Cinemas at Castle Towers. The march starts at 7am and will proceed down Castle Street to the Castle Hill Bowling Club (next to the Castle Hill RSL Club). It is a downhill 10 minute walk. Marchers will then go to the auditorium at the Castle Hill Bowling Club to hear a talk by a guest speaker who works in the field of DFV.

There will also be a DFV prayer vigil at Wesley Uniting Church, Showground Road, Castle Hill on Friday 30th May 2025 from 5pm to 8pm.
