
The Power of Intimacy as Part of Peace and Welcome

As the Church we are a community and, more than that, we name ourselves with names such as 'The Body of Christ' and 'the Family of Faith.' These terms speak of intimacy. After all, there is nothing more intimate than our bodies and our families. Of course, intimacy is not just about physical intimacy but is about being known and knowing others in a deep way. This is made clear in the way that sexual intercourse is sometimes referred to as 'knowing' someone in the Bible. (See Genesis 4:1 where Adam knew Eve) However, intimacy is the deep emotional connection, closeness, and bond between people, characterized by mutual trust, vulnerability, and open communication of feelings, thoughts, and experiences. While it can involve physical closeness and is often associated with romantic relationships, true intimacy is fundamentally about emotional closeness, self-disclosure, and feeling truly known, loved, and accepted by another person.

It develops over time through consistent effort and is a significant predictor of a relationship's health and stability. As a community of faith, intimacy is part of being a welcoming Church. People don't truly feel welcomed until they are known and know others. Therefore, thinking about intimacy is important as we think about being more missional and being an even more truly welcoming Church.

Our brain is wired for closeness and without it, it struggles. It tricks us into expecting rejection. Lack of intimacy doesn't just make us feel lonely. It rewires our brain to believe we deserve to be alone. Studies show that when people lack social bonding, their Anterior Cingulate Cortex (ACC), the part of the brain that processes pain, lights up, reacting to social rejection the same way it would to a physical injury. This makes people withdraw even more. reinforcing a cycle of isolation. In other words, the less connection we have, the harder it becomes to seek it out. It warps our self-perception. This information comes from the video: What Lack of Intimacy **Does to Your Brain**

It is really worth watching to understand some of the neuroscience and psychology.





Given this kind of information and understanding, how we create safe intimacy in our Church is really important. It is linked to welcoming, because without it people not only feel rejected, but believe that they deserve to be so. This is completely at odds with the way God welcomed people as Christ and taught us to do the same. Think of as many stories that you can where Jesus connected with and welcomed people. This deeper sense of intimacy, the deep emotional connection, closeness, and bond between people, characterized by mutual trust, vulnerability, and open communication of feelings, thoughts, and experiences, is why we put starting points for this in our services.

The passing of the peace is about a starting point for intimacy. We make connections with those around us and even make physical contact. This, given the psychological and neuropsychological aspects of intimacy does literally help us as people into a deeper sense of peace. Of course, this one aspect of our services is not in itself enough. It is starting point and a reminder that we are connected with each other. We might have come into the Church space for a service and not connected with anyone but the person or people sitting next to us. Passing the peace





invites us into greater intimacy. It recalls our connection with each other and is a starting point which we should remember to grow on. We should remember to continue this work of peacemaking and welcome.

Intimacy is important in our Church life. Moments like passing the peace and times such as morning tea help us in this, but they are not enough in themselves. That is why being part of home groups and Bible studies, having social events and welcoming each other into each other's homes to share a meal are equally, if not more important to build a healthy and truly welcoming community where there are spaces and times for newcomers to be invited into and become known as they get to know others.

So, given this, how welcoming are we as a Church at St. Matthew's Uniting Baulkham Hills? How much do we value intimacy? How well do we build it in our community and how willing are we to share it with others? This gives us something to think about.


People of all faiths, explorers and doubters welcome to a space of creativity and community inspired by the beauty of the natural world


Come along to yarn over yarn, colour-in and chat about creation and join a safe space to share spirituality, creativity and the beauty of nature with others.

Early Drug Diversion Update from Uniting Fair Treatment:

The Early Drug Diversion Initiative (EDDI), introduced in NSW in early 2024, allows Police officers to issue a \$400 on-the-spot fine for first or second low-level drug possession offences, which is waived if offenders attend an hour-long health counselling phone session.

The EDDI scheme was created as a way to divert people away from the justice system and instead provide them with a health intervention around their drug and alcohol use.

The rules around the February 2024 Early Drug Diversion Initiative (EDDI) are considered too narrow by professionals working with drug users, when compared with the parameters of similar schemes in the UK. In NSW the EDDI includes the following limitations:

Referral is at the discretion of the Police

A person can only have a maximum number of two instances of being caught with illicit drugs.

Only people found with one single type of illicit drug are eligible

On average only 7.1% of people caught with personal quantities of illicit drugs have been offered diversion across the state of NSW. However, the picture in Western Sydney is much worse. The referral rate is less than 1% from areas including Campbelltown, Ryde, Camden, Blacktown, Fairfield, Nepean, Campsie and Riverstone.

The 2024 Drug Summit Report has already recommended improvements to the EDDI scheme, including limiting police discretion and removing the two strike policy, so that the people who need it most can actually access it. Uniting Fair Treatment are encouraging us to write to our local state MPs to let them know we want to see a better EDDI scheme. A person's postcode shouldn't dictate their access to drug diversion.
