A mission is a task or purpose which is set to be achieved. Our mission is set by God. It is about joining God in God's mission – that is God's purpose – to redeem the world and transform all of Creation. God's mission is to bring the Kingdom of God/Heaven further into being as humanity is brought into right relationship with God, each other and the whole of creation. In theological terms it is often referred to as 'missio dei' – the mission of God. Thus, it is not something we do, but is a call to a task and purpose we join God in. We don't do mission. We are given a mission to carry out. Our carrying out of our mission is referred to as our ministry. Our ministry is the whole of our life and witness as a community of faith, not just certain activities or initiatives.

Our own Assembly document on mission notes: "The Church is brought into existence by God and is **called to serve God's mission**. It neither creates itself nor its mission but is to recognize its dependence on God's Spirit for its life and purpose."

National Assembly of the Uniting Church in Australia, Towards a Theology Relating to Mission (2010), §18

Our mission as the Church, being part of the Uniting Church in Australia and part of the holy, catholic [meaning universal] and apostolic Church, is to join in God's mission. God's mission is about bringing further into being the Kingdom of God and brining it nearer into being in our context and community along with the redemption and renewal of all people as part of the redemption and renewal of all creation.

Mission is not something we do. It is a tasking or work which we are given to achieve a meaningful goal. For us as the Church it is our call by God to join in God's mission through our life and witness expressed in missional ministry.



If God is love and those who live in love live in God and God in them [1 John 4: 16], and if we are created in the image of God [Genesis 1:27], and if we know love through how God has loved us by becoming the Christ [John 3: 16] and laying down that life as an atoning sacrifice [1 John 3: 16], and if the greatest of all commandments is to love God with all our being and love others as ourselves [Matthew 22: 38-39, Mark 12: 30-31 both of which are drawn from Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18] then

our mission is to live a life of love, loving God in worship by laying down our lives in love for others [1 John 3: 16].

Our core mission is to join God in God's work, to be God's people as we use our gifts and talents to lay down our lives in love for others as God, as Christ, laid down his life for us. God is love and when we live love to others we live in God and God lives in us. This is what we are called to be and do, and as part of this life and witness, we are called to be a channel through which others come into right relationship with God and are invited to join God in God's mission.

This is our mission should we choose to accept it. It certainly gives us something to think about.

It is Not Good for us To be Alone



Genesis chapter 1 tells us the ancient story of the creation of the universe. In six days, God creates the heavens and the earth, the oceans, the land, the plants, the animals and "God created humankind finally image" (Genesis 1:27). Seven times we are told that God looked on his work and saw that it was good, indeed it was very good. In Genesis 2, however, we hear of something that is not good.

Genesis 2 zooms in on the creation of humankind. God creates a man, places him in the garden, then sees that he is alone and says "It is not good that the man should be alone" (Genesis 2:18). Many animals are brought forth, until finally another human is created, Adam's wife Eve.

It is not good for us to be alone. Sometimes loneliest places are those full of other people - people who are in relationship with each other, with families and friends sharing life together. Being on the outskirts of the group, seeing the interactions, but not sharing in them is isolating. Having no way into the group is devastating. There are many reasons people may be isolated. It might be due to physical or mental health, age, language and cultural barriers or other causes of exclusion.

We are made to be in relationship, not only with God, but with each other. In John 17, Jesus speaks of himself being in the Father, the Father being in him and us being in them

and says "I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them. (John 17:26). With God's love in and amongst us, let us welcome and love each other. How tragic would it be if someone came into our midst and yet felt lonely.

On Sunday 21st September, we will be having another combined morning tea at 9am. I encourage you to stay behind or come along early (or early if even super you attend 6:45pm!) so that we can have this time to actively be in relationship with each other. Even if you can't make it, perhaps consider how you can strengthen your connection with others this month, maybe through a quick phone call or text message to someone you haven't seen for a while, because it is not good for any of us to be alone.

Educating ourselves about modern slavery and human trafficking Unmasking the True Cost of Online Scams

We know that we need to be very careful to avoid becoming a victim of scams and we wonder what sort of people could possibly perpetrate such crimes, often against the most vulnerable people in our community. However, the people who are working for the criminal organisations running scams are often enslaved people who are trafficked to work for them. It is estimated that there are currently at least 100,000 trafficked persons working in this industry in Southeast Asia and other parts of the world. Below is an excerpt from an article by the Centre for Strategic International Studies in Washington DC, (released on 12th December 2024) explaining how the criminal syndicates operate:

"So-called "fraud factories" have their roots in Southeast Asia's gambling industry and are closely tied to Chinese organized crime groups. When the casinos built by Chinese transnational criminal groups were effectively shut down by the Covid-19 pandemic, the criminal organisations were forced to seek out other means of generating income. In many cases, abandoned casinos and hotels were converted into large-scale forced scamming centres, where trafficking victims are forced to scam unsuspecting individuals across the globe.

Victims of this form of trafficking are usually job hunters who respond to fraudulent employment opportunities in fields such as customer service, information technology (IT), and computer programming. Traffickers pose as job recruiters and target individuals with exploitable technological or language skills, convincing victims of their legitimacy with interviews and live communication. After the victims travel to the location of the "job," traffickers confiscate their passports, lock them in heavily guarded compounds, and force them to conduct scams.

People from over 100 countries have been trafficked to Southeast Asia's fraud factories. The U.S. Department of State's 2024 Trafficking in Persons (TIP) Report specifically highlights the trafficking of victims from Ghana, Nigeria, Uganda, Kenya, Peru, Brazil, and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), among other countries. Many of these victims are young and tech-savvy and hail from regions where unemployment rates are high and there is a surplus of freshly minted tech graduates."

News From the Finance Committee

St Matthew's Uniting Church Budget for 2025-26

The Finance Committee presented its budget for the 2026 financial year at the Church Annual General Meeting on Sunday 17 August 2025.

The outcomes for 2025 and projections present a more promising view of Church revenues than we have seen for some time. The 2025 financial year returned a better than expected result, with an \$80,000 surplus against a significant budgeted deficit. In particular, revenues benefited from: a strong direct debit and Push Pay donations (+\$76k against budget); loose and envelope donations that were above budget (\$10k), and a strong showing again from the Op Shop (+\$10k). Overall expenses were some \$90,000 lower than budgeted, resulting from a consolidation of employment costs and deferral of some church maintenance projects.

Looking forward, these results have underpinned a budget result for 2026 of around a \$45,000 surplus, with similar results projected into the next few years.

Also notable is the significant ongoing contributions that we receive from the highly regarded St Matthew's Uniting Preschool, and the very successful Op Shop. Starting from 2025, St Matthew's has elected to contribute 10 per cent of Op Shop revenues to the broader community, with these being channeled to support people escaping domestic violence in the Hills District.

There was congregation interest in the status of the roof replacement loans. We reported that a kind member of the congregation had placed funds as on offset against the loans, meaning that we do not have any debt servicing costs for the main loan. In addition, some \$4,500 had been specifically donated during 2025 against the roof replacement fund and has been allocated against the outstanding principal.

At the Annual General Meeting, we especially thanked the congregation for their response to the call during the year to consider their giving habits in the context of the Church's mission. Their generous support has greatly assisted in shoring up the Church's projected financial position. We also observed that direct debit offers a more convenient option to donate than in times gone by and has the advantage of not attracting fees payable against donations.

Finance Committee Chair, Dom Schuster, thanked the efforts of the volunteer Finance Committee, including Alastair Burn as treasurer, Amanda Manson as secretary, and members Barry Gregory, Hugh Darling, Denis Bell, Peter Wienand, Alexander Lawless and Jon Humphries. He acknowledged the contribution of Leith Lawless, who has recently stepped down from the Committee. Members of the St Matthew's community are encouraged to nominate themselves for the Finance Committee if they feel that they can assist the work of the group.

The Finance Committee has recently discussed the use of offering envelopes and has decided to continue using them for the foreseeable future.

Daily Wisdom Daily readings with john Main



The Stages of our progress in meditation will come about in their own time. God's own time. We in fact only hinder this progression by becoming too self-conscious about our stage of development. This is where a teacher is of immense help for keeping you on a straight course. But basically your teacher has only one instruction to give you and that is: to say your mantra. More that this is simply encouragement and comfort until the mantra is rooted in your consciousness. The path of enlightenment is one we tread for ourselves. Each person wins wisdom for himself. The teacher is there to keep you steadily going forward. The word 'guru' itself, dispeller of darkness, means the one who is steady.

The greatest temptation of all is to complicate ourselves. Unless you become like little children...' Meditation simplifies us, simplifies us to the point where we can receive the fullness of truth and the fullness of love. It prepare us and enables us to listen with childlike attention to the Spirit of Jesus within us. As we persevere in mediation, we enter ever more deeply into relationship with this Spirit, with God who is love dwelling in our hearts, enlightening us and vitalizing us.

Word into Silence

In response to Jon Humphries' last month's piece on Praying Prayer, I want to thank him for his words. The St. Matthew's Christian Meditation Groups have been offering prayerful spaces which embody what Jon wrote about through times for prayerful meditation for the past 23 years.

The groups were started by Betty Carmody who recognised in herself what this practice of being silent and still in the presence of God's Spirit could do for everyone.

Since 2016, myself and others who learnt from Betty, have continued to facilitate one, now two groups every week of the year where anyone can come to learn how to begin and continue the discipline of sitting in silence giving our full attention to God in our hearts. We find attending the groups helps us to remain faithful to spending time with God every day and how the fruits of the spirit generate within as a result-how we do not know.

Each person receives a book of daily readings by John Main that offer gentle encouragement and wise inspiration for every day of the year. Some of these

readings are included in the Christian Meditation Article that appears in this monthly IN FOCUS.

There is ample warm, welcoming space for anyone to join on a casual or regular basis. It costs nothing and we strictly adhere to the hour session including up to 30 minutes of silence.

You may socially distance, wear masks if needed, wrap up in a blanket, wear comfy, casual clothes. We meet on Monday in the Community Room upstairs and in the main Church space on Tuesday.

St. Matthew's offers this peaceful, quiet space for all ages to do the work of communing with God in silence, stillness and the simplicity in Baulkham Hills.
