Something to think about 7 September Pentecost 13

Revised Common Lectionary Readings:

Jeremiah 18:1-11 Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 Philemon 1:1-21 Luke 14:25-33

The Power of Sabbathing

Observing the Sabbath is in the Ten Commandments. lt is the fourth commandment. Exodus 20: 8-11 states. ""Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God. On it you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your male or female servant, nor your animals, nor any foreigner residing in your towns. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore, the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy."

In Hebrew, the word for Sabbath is]' שַׁבָּת Shabbat] which literally means "rest" or "cessation". It comes from the Hebrew verb שַבּת[shavat], meaning "to cease" or "to rest". For Jewish people, Shabbat is a day set aside for rest and worship, commemorating the day God rested after creating the world. It is traditionally what we in our modern calendar and pattern of the week name as Saturday, which is the seventh day of the week.

Whereas, the Sabbath, is traditionally Saturday, according Google to Christians (other than denominations like the Seventh Day Adventists) generally Sabbath on Sunday because it's the day Jesus was resurrected, which the early church began to commemorate as the "Lord's Day". This shift from the biblical Saturday Sabbath to Sunday reflects the covenant established Christ's work and offers a foretaste of God's eternal rest. Key events like the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost and early Christian gatherings to break bread on the first day of the week further cemented Sunday as the day for Christian worship and celebration.

many Christians, keeping Sabbath is no longer really important. Theologically, Christians might not keep the Sabbath because it was part of the Old Testament Mosaic Covenant, which was fulfilled and replaced by the New Covenant in Jesus Christ, and instead Sunday is the Lord's Day and we therefore start our week (Sunday being technically the first day of the week) with dedication to God, especially God whom we know in Christ. Maybe we think that we are keeping it because a weekend is structured into the working week pattern and we go to Church. Yet, for many of us, going to Church is increasingly a flexible feast. We mostly go, but it can give way to other events at times.



Shabbat (שַׁבָּת), -"rest" or "cessation" Maybe the Sabbath is seen as less a formal rule or commandment and more of a flexible guideline because Jesus performed at least seven known healings on the Sabbath, which included times like the healing of Peter's mother-in-law's fever, a man with a withered hand, and a man born blind, as well as the woman bent over by satan which we was our Gospel reading two Sundays ago. Of course, there are still many Christians who religiously go to Church as part of their faith and discipleship.

Whether we keep it or not and whether Sunday is our sabbath or not, maybe it is good to revisit why sabbathing important. In Mark 2:27 Jesus states that, "the Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath." This means that the Sabbath is a gift from God, intended to provide humanity with a day of rest and spiritual rejuvenation, not to become a burdensome obligation. It emphasizes that rules and traditions should serve people's well-being, rather than the other way around, promoting flexibility and compassion over rigid adherence to the law. Yet, Jesus didn't come to undo the Covenant or the Torah/Law. For Jesus, like the prophets, it is the connection to God and the adherence to the way of God, lived in love, compassion and justice, which is important. We should not underestimate the importance of sabbathing, nor water down its meaning to being about rest and religion.

Sabbathing, as mentioned, does have a component of rest, but its core aim is a circuit breaker in the busyness of life to make space to reconnect with God. It is a spiritual discipline which sets time apart for being in connection with God. Our connection with God, who is always present as Spirit, but the mindfulness of which is sometimes pushed aside in our thinking, is importance. Rest is helpful, but it of key is really only helpful in the context of the mission of God. Sabbathing is about resourcing us for ministry as part of the mission of God. However, lest we just think about it functionally, we need to value it relationally. Sabbathing as a spiritual discipline is about reconnecting with God when we have disconnected.

Sabbathing is about connecting with God. For God in the Creation narrative it makes space for God to walk with us as humans after the work of creation. For us as humans, it is about us walking with God. Sabbathing is a spiritual discipline to remind us to remain connected with God. The weekly pattern of this discipline is not itself the focus or purpose, but the focus and purpose is connection with God. Thus, we should never only seek to connect with God once a week. We should always be in connection with God. All we do should and every interaction with others should be filled with a mindfulness of the presence of God. God is the ground of our being. Our human being is centred in God in whom we live and move and seek to emulate, because Christ is God in human being, and we are disciples of Christ.

In last week's epistle reading, Hebrews 13: 15 reminds us, "Through him [Christ], then, let us *continually* offer a sacrifice of praise to God." Our lives should be continually dedicated to God, and our worship is our living the love of God to all at all times. Weekly sabbathing can help us build the discipline of reconnection with God, but so can daily sabbathing through prayer and meditation and reading of Scripture. Yet, let us not think about these things functionally as things to do, but relationally as mindfulness practices which remind us of what is supposed to be continually important. Sabbathing is not important in itself, but its importance lies in remembering that we are loved by God, that we love God, and that we love God by embodying God's love to others. How we each go about better honouring the intent and power of sabbathing in our lives without getting legalistic about it, nor reducing it to self-centred relaxation is something to truly think about



The real cost of flowers

Did you know that cut flowers are currently the only perishable product sold in Australia that does not require 'Country of Origin' labelling. Flower Industry Australia claims imported blooms now make up about half of Australia's flower market, and nearly all of the cut flowers sold in supermarkets.

Many of the cheaper blooms are from countries with poor human rights records and are treated with toxic chemicals for biosecurity reasons, but neither of these things are mandatory to declare to the customer. Imports are mainly grown in Kenya, Ecuador, China, Malaysia and Colombia, where labour costs are low, and supply chains less than transparent. In Kenya the minimum wage in the sector is around AU\$177 a month, says Mary Kambo, a labour rights specialist at Kenya's Human Rights Commission. "But we have many farms that are paying way below," Ms Kambo says. "I've seen pay slips where women are taking home less than \$US5 (\$8) in a month." This is where many of the world's supermarket roses come from.

The Human Cost: Modern Slavery in the Flower Trade

- Flowers from Kenya, Ecuador, and India are often produced under exploitative conditions.
- Child labour is common—some children work 12-hour days caring for roses.
- Migrant workers in these countries face wage theft, passport confiscation, and forced labour.
- Australia's Modern Slavery Act requires big companies to report risks, but enforcement is weak.

The Environmental Cost: A Hidden Carbon Footprint

- A single imported rose emits 3.5 kg of CO2 due to being transported the long distance to get to Australian markets that's 35x more than a locally grown one.
- Floriculture drains water resources, e.g., Kenya's Lake Naivasha has lost 30% of its volume due to irrigation.
- Pesticide pollution from flower farms contaminates rivers and harms biodiversity in these countries.
- Australians discard 12,000 tonnes of flower waste annually, much of it plastic-wrapped.

What Can Consumers Do?

Choose locally grown flowers to cut emissions and support Aussie farmers.

Look for Fair Trade or ethical certifications when buying imported blooms.

Demand better transparency from retailers about their supply chains.


