Something to think about 21 September Pentecost 15

Revised Common Lectionary Readings:

Jeremiah 8:18-9:1 Psalm 79:1-9 1 Timothy 2:1-7 Luke 16:1-13

Humbled as Humankind

Christianity doesn't often make the news in Australia, and when it does it is usually not good. Too often news to do with Christianity is about sex abuse or scandals in Church schools. We might occasionally have a good new story about Youth Off the Streets or Wayside Chapel, but they are normally quite rare. In the past week the news was not so much bad about Christianity, but the death of a prominent, and somewhat controversial Christian leader in the USA - Charlie Kirk, who was sadly assassinated.

The death of Charlie Kirk rose him to prominence for some of us, who may not have heard about him or why he was a popular figure for conservative Christians. He was an influential right-wing activist, author, and media personality who promoted a form of populist, Christian nationalist conservatism closely aligned with the "Make Again" (MAGA) America Great movement. He was the co-founder of Turning Point USA (TPUSA),

organization dedicated to advancing conservative viewpoints among young people. and a controversial figure for others. I did not agree with Charlie Kirk, and I found some of his ideas abhorrent and an anathema to my understanding of the way of God in Christ. He had strong beliefs and about women, stances abortion, LGBTQI rights, immigration and of course Christianity. There is a sad sense of irony in his death as he controversially stated that a certain number of gun deaths were a "prudent deal" and an acceptable cost for preserving the right to bear arms. Yet, I do not take any joy in his death, and I mourn yet another moral injury to our human kindness.

We are called in Christ to love our enemies. We are called to embody the love of God. We are called to love the fruit of God's presence in us as Holy Spirit. We are called to walk the extra mile as we challenge injustice. The strange way we as Christians interpret the teachings of Christ and Scriptures is something of a mystery. I don't say that in judgement of those who believe different to me, but by statement of fact that Christians who claim to hold to the same faith, read the same Scriptures and all claim to be disciples of Jesus can hold such opposing stances and positions on such a range of issues. It is a key reason why some reject the faith because they cannot see how it makes sense.

However, it is not this polarised nature of the Church or our division which flies in the face of the call to be united in Christ [John 17:23;Ephesians 4:1-6; 1 Corinthians 1:10; 2 Corinthians 13:11] in a ministry of reconciliation [2 Corinthians 5:18].

The response to the death of Charlie Kirk raises for me an issue of awareness and justice. The death of Charlie Kirk was an injustice, but that is not what I wish to focus our thinking on. His death and the lament over it highlights the often unheeded reality that the unjust death of one prominent white privileged person, which is tragic in itself, goes noticed and mourned and cared about by many such as myself whilst tens of thousands of such injustices are wrought each day by humankind upon each other which do not make the news or stir the hearts of the people of God, nor move us to any action which might work to prevent such horror.

We are called to love our neighbour. [Leviticus 19:18; Matthew 22:39; 12:31; Mark Romans 13:9: Galatians 5:14] which includes loving our enemies [Matthew 5:44 and Luke 6:27-28]. Yet, the issue is about us who we see as our neighbour. Do we just see those like us and who think like us as our neighbour? Is it the people just near to us, either in relationship or in locality? We are called to embody the love of God, for to love our neighbour is to love God, because how can we love God whom we can't see if we can't love our other whom we can see? [1 John 4:20-21] However, I would challenge us with the notion that God, in the call to do justly (Micah 6:8) calls us to also love the neighbour that we can't see but can know about if we just made the effort to look into where there is suffering and injustice in the world.

We are called to walk the extra mile as we challenge injustice. Praying about it and asking God to do all the work to make things better in the world is not enough. We are the Body of Christ, the embodiment of love of God in the world and we claim to be God's hands and feet, and sadly too often God's voice. Let being like the us stop monkeys who see, no evil, hear no evil or speak no evil, nor like the newer fourth monkey who sits on their screen seeing and hearing all about evils in the world, but sits alongside the others doing nothing else. Who are our unseen neighbours and how might we really them? show love to That is something to think about.









SHORT HISTORY OF SYDNEY FERRIES

How doing little things makes a big difference.

Topic: Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery in Australia

United Nations General Assembly: From the report of the visit to Australia of the Special Rapporteur on contemporary forms of slavery, including its causes and consequences, Tomoya Obokata. Published 16th July 2025

Temporary Migrant Workers (IIIA p 8 of the report) - a summary is below:

- '31. The Special Rapporteur wishes to express serious concerns about the treatment of temporary migrant workers in Australia. Those workers are often employed in high-risk sectors such as agriculture, horticulture, food processing, including meat processing, healthcare and social assistance, accommodation, domestic work, hospitality, cleaning and security. Particular attention should be given to workers under the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) scheme, the Domestic Worker (Diplomatic or Consular) stream under a Temporary Work (International Relations) visa, the Skills in Demand visa (formerly the Temporary Skill Shortage visa), the Working Holiday visa, the Student visa, Bridging visas with no work rights, and Skilled Employer Sponsored Regional visas. Employers who use the false promise of nomination for permanent residency through the Employer Nomination Scheme visa is another concern. Undocumented workers, including disengaged workers under the PALM scheme, are another category who face the most significant risks of exploitation and contemporary forms of slavery.
- 32. The Special Rapporteur has received credible information from numerous stakeholders, including from workers themselves, revealing alarming and sometimes severe patterns of exploitation by employers, labour hire companies and migration agents across various sectors. The exploitative practices include deceptive recruitment, underpayment or withholding of wages, unilateral changes to or termination of contracts, excessive deductions, unreasonable production targets, racial discrimination, hazardous working conditions, harassment, threats and even violence, including sexual and gender-based violence, for example violence that can arise from reliance on employer-provided accommodation, as well as dismissal due to pregnancy.

Reportedly, labour hire companies, immigration agents and education agents in the home countries of international students often engage in deceptive practices that push workers into debt bondage. In addition, some temporary migrants, including Pacific Australia Labour Mobility scheme workers, are exposed to conditions of overcrowding and substandard and unsafe housing.'
