Something to think about 9 November Pentecost 22

Revised Common Lectionary Readings:

Haggai 2:1-2:9 Psalm 145:1-5, 17-21 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17 Luke 20:27-38

Getting our minds around gender diversity

Most of us have heard the letters LGBTQI or LGBTQI+. These stand for Lesbian, Gay, Bi-sexual, Transgender, Queer and Intersex. Some may not be aware that these have been expanded to LGBTQIA+. The "A" is for asexual, which are people who experience no sexual attraction for other people, but also includes Aromantic (little to no romantic attraction) and Agender (without gender) identities. The "+" (Plus) represents all other identities that are not explicitly listed in the letters of the acronym.

For many of us getting our heads around these terms is not easy, especially if we have grown up in a tradition or culture which has taught us that there are only two genders: Male and female and the 'normal' [and some would say 'right'] expression of sexuality is between the two different sexes. Many of us have been taught that God made people either male or female and sexuality is only rightly expressed in heterosexual normality. This, we have been taught, is natural.

I am a parent of two queer daughters and have had to do my own work learning and re-thinking my thinking. The Uniting Church Assembly has endorsed a proposal that seeks to affirm, welcome and honour the life and faith of transgender, intersex and gender diverse people in our Church. As part of the proposal, the 17th Assembly members agreed "to recognise that transgender, gender diverse and intersex people are beloved by God and full members of the Body of Christ in baptism." https://uniting.church/affirming-gender-diverse-people/

In this piece I want to sidestep discussion about different forms of sexuality for a moment and just focus on the letter 'I' which is for Intersex because these are realities that people have to face without inherent choice. In our modern society in recent times speaking about the pronouns that people use for themselves has become part of how we identify and introduce ourselves and indicate how we want to be addressed. Again, for those of us who have come from traditions or cultures where there is only male and female gender and we only accept the gender one is born with physically, it can be very difficult to get our minds around that which seems to go against what we have been taught is natural and what we have been told God, through the Bible, has taught us is right and good. Yet, what do we do when the gender someone, or we, are born with is unclear or complicated?

As we seek to expand our understanding about how we accept and welcome diversity in our Church, it can be helpful to start with Intersex because it is a physical or genetic way that people are born. Intersex is when someone is born with variations in sex characteristics. including chromosomes, gonads [testes or ovaries], or anatomy, that don't fit typical male or female binary definitions. Experts estimate that up to 1.7 percent of the population are born with intersex. Biological variations of Intersex variations can include different combinations of chromosomes (like XXY), having both testicular and ovarian tissue, or having genitalia that is not distinctly male or female.

Some intersex traits are evident at birth, but others may not be discovered until puberty, or even later in life during medical testing for other reasons like infertility. Intersex is not a disease. Being intersex is a naturally occurring variation in humans and is not a disorder or a condition that needs to be "fixed". It has an impact on identity. An intersex person's assigned sex at birth does not determine their gender identity. People who are intersex can identify as male, female, both, or neither.

Intersex is a helpful place to start in getting our heads around that which stretches what many of us have been conditioned to think as normal. It is helpful because this is a natural condition because it occurs within the normal human population. Whilst not very common, up to two in one hundred people might be born intersex. Like genetic birth differences or other physical differences in appearance of ability this fits within the "natural" order of things and stretches our understanding of natural.

As many of us may not have encountered many or anyone who is intersex it might be helpful to meet some people via video and watch and listen to their story.

The theological question in this is whether or does God make people different? How do we understand the work of God in such things as intersex and other genetic and developmental differences?

Whilst many of us within the Christian tradition find it hard to get our minds around this, the ancient Jewish rabbis tried to understand this. In ancient rabbinic literature there is mention of 6-8 'genders' depending on which commentator you read. The Talmud, a huge and authoritative compendium of Jewish legal traditions, contains in fact no less than seven gender designations including:

Zachar: male.

Nekevah: female.

Androgynos: having both male and female characteristics.

Tumtum: lacking sexual characteristics.

Aylonit: identified female at birth without developing secondary female sexual characteristics at puberty.

Saris hamah: identified male at birth without developing secondary male sexual characteristics at puberty.

Saris adam: identified male at birth without developing secondary male sexual characteristics because of castration.

The rabbis did not use the word gender as we do today, as referring to a cultural construct distinct from biological sex.

The seven genders they describe are distinguished by physical and biological realities, not culturally conditioned categories. Rabbinic literature describes God's role in physical gender diversity by viewing God as the ultimate creator who made humankind in a dual image, implying both male and female attributes within the divine. While God is often described using masculine imagery, this is seen as reflecting God's relationship with humanity rather than God's own gender, and sources note that God is ultimately without gender. Some interpretations, such as an early Palestinian midrash, propose that Adam was initially created as an androgynous being who was later split into male and female, suggesting that physical diversity is a fundamental aspect of God's creation.

Intersex people present us with a challenge of how to stretch our understanding of gender norms, because if we subscribe to such verses as Psalm 139, Verses 13 and 14, which states, "For you created my inmost being. You knit me together in my mother's womb: I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made," then we have to accept that God makes people different. If we are awesomely and wonderfully made, then does not this apply to all people regardless of their differences? This is something to think and pray about.

An Experiment in Grafitude

The interesting thing about graftlude letters is that is has even more power when you not only give someone a graftlude letter, but read it to them. Dr. Martin E. P. Seligman, a psychologist at the University of Pennsylvania, tested the impact of various positive psychology interventions on 411 people, each compared with a control assignment of writing about early memories. When their week's assignment was to write and personally deliver a letter of graftlude to someone who had never been properly thanked for his or her kindness, participants immediately exhibited a huge increase in happiness scores. This impact was greater than that from any other intervention, with benefits lasting for a month for both the letter writer and the recipient

The Power of a Gratitude Letter

 Write a letter to someone who has encouraged you in faith or been a key person in your development as a disciple.

2

- 2. Go to that person and read that letter to them
- 3. Give the letter to that person

If the person is no longer living. Read the letter to someone close to you and then try to give the letter to someone related to the person you wrote to.



How doing little things makes a big difference.

Topic: State Government's Response to Drug Treatment Reform - from Uniting Fair Treatment

The NSW State Government released its response to the Drug Summit report in late October and Uniting Fair Treatment states that it is most disappointing. It fails to adopt, resource and implement the 56 recommendations of the Drug Summit Report in full - to comprehensively deal with our unfair drug laws and the very real harm they cause.

Here is Uniting Fair Treatment's preliminary analysis:

We welcome the support for much-needed reforms to the Early Drug Diversion Initiative scheme, however, this was already going to happen as part of its two-year review.

We welcome the commitment to a whole-of-government drug and alcohol strategy within 12 months. This is a sorely needed item that was also recommended in the Ice Inquiry.

The government has "noted" recommendations to allow for more injecting centres, stating there has not been sufficient evidence for additional centres. This is in stark contrast to the evidence given at the 2024 NSW Drug Summit that showed the lives that had been saved at the Kings Cross Injecting Centre.

In terms of an "investigation into cannabis driving laws"- we don't need another investigation; we need the action already identified by the Cannabis Inquiry.

The government has outright rejected the recommendation to cease use of sniffer dogs and strip searching in the wake of the landmark court ruling against the practice- this was a stunning response that goes against all principles of harm reduction.

Uniting Fair Treatment are concerned that this latest disappointment is only going to lead to further harm and further stigma in NSW. Regardless - they will not stop pushing and agitating for change and will continue to fight for better laws alongside the most marginalised in our community.
