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Something to think about 30 November Advent 1

Revised Common Lectionary Readings:

Isaiah 2:1-5 Psalm 122 Romans 13:11-14 Matthew 24:36-44

What is Real Hope?

Last week after some debilitating episodes of attacks of pain I was diagnosed with kidney stones, one of which was in transit from my body and was the source of discomfort. With the special services happening last Sunday, I could have just hoped it would all be well or stressed about if I had an attack in the service. Instead, I chose hope rooted in faith, where I just trusted that God would hold all as it should be. I planned for contingencies, but in my heart of hearts I believed that in the end they would not be needed, and luckily or providentially, they weren't.

Similarly, as I drove to Church it was grey and raining. Again, I just settled into faithful hope that all would be well, and it was. Of course, I began making contingency plans in my head, but something in my being told me or knew that all would turn out fine, and literally it did.

I have shared this Bible Project video before, but it is worth going back to as we enter into Advent and remember the liturgical call to take up hope once more.

Hope is a complicated word with there being many forms of hope. As the video suggests, it is not optimism – that is hoping that things might turn out OK. It is deeper and more powerful than that. Ness and I wrestle with this in our recent 'On the Way' episode about hope and what it has to do with Christmas.

Advent is a season of preparation and anticipation, but being a liturgical season, I believe that we have liturgical work to do - that is work as the people of God. It is not simply psyching ourselves up for Christmas or hoping that it is a lovely celebration. Our liturgical work is also not just about lighting candles and holding nice services. The real work that we have is to do with the mission of God and living out our faith. Our hope is that our services will encourage and resource us in this, but our Church services are not our true liturgy. Advent has four key missional tasks in our tradition, at least those of us who use Advent candles, and the work of the services is to remind us of this and encourage us towards attending to the call of God. The first is that of hope.

Hope is an important work. It is not simply an emotion or a nebulous wish for something good, at least not in the context of faith. Our hope as Christians is that the work of God, which we deeply learn through God as Christ, is that the world will be transformed and the ministry of reconciliation and the work of true justice will be accomplished. It is

no accident that the Revised Common Lectionary sets for this first week of Advent a reading about the end all things, which some refer to as 'the Rapture.' This passage has Jesus impressing on people the imperative to be at work for God. This is a repeated theme in his teachings. We can marry this with the work of hope in Advent as in all seasons of the year and of life.

In all of this it is good to remember that our hope is not in a something or a somewhen it is in someone. Our hope is in God. It is God who is faithful and who is at work for good in all things, all times and all people. It is God who is at work for good, even though our circumstances might not change. It is God who redeems us as God redeems all things. It is God who ultimately help us to change and change our perspective and mindset, even though life and our circumstances in it may not.

Hope is ultimately a nebulous thing. It is hard to pin down exactly what it is. It is sometimes hard to find and hold onto. It can seem fragile or ephemeral. It can seem that there is nothing to it. Yet, it is centred in God who is all in all and is the ground of our being. Our hope is in God and God's faithfulness. It may not change much externally, but it can change everything internally. It may not seem to make much or any difference on the outside but can make all the difference on the inside.

This can seem like religious empty promises or spiritual propaganda, and sometimes it can be. Yet, those of us who have found hope in God when things were hopeless, know that hope is real and powerful. We have God. We have hope. We have work to do. Yes, this is something to think about, but it is also something to seek out and find.





How doing little things makes a big difference.

Topic: COP31 and our South Pacific Neighbours - a disappointing outcome

Last week we heard the disappointing news that Australia has ceded its bid to co-host the COP31 climate conference with Pacific Nations. The Rev. Faaimata (Mata) Havea Hiliau (the Moderator of the Uniting Church Synod of NSW and ACT) said, "The importance of these meetings cannot be overstated, and many had hoped that we could shine a light on Australia and the Pacific by hosting this meeting."

From the Uniting Climate Action Network (UCAN) media release:

In this announcement, we grieve the lost opportunity for Australia's First Nations communities and Pasifika diaspora, along with our Pacific Island neighbours, to be centred on the world stage and have direct access to people in power.

As Christians who care for climate justice, we must continue to amplify the voices of those most vulnerable to climate change. Jesus stood with those on the margins and told us that how we respond to those most in need is also our response to Him. Christ calls us to stand for justice, even if no one else is speaking and acting. Just as the prophet Isaiah describes, we must reflect the justice and compassion of God in the face of this challenge of climate change.

As part of Australia's agreement with Türkiye over hosting COP31, Chris Bowen the Minister for Climate Change and Energy, will take on the role of President for COP31 negotiations.
