Something to think about 14 December Advent 3

Revised Common Lectionary Readings:

Isaiah 35:1-10 Psalm 146:5-10 Luke 1:46b-55 James 5:7-10 Matthew 11:2-11

Bringing Joy

I believe that joy is centred beyond ourselves. I believe that joy, true joy, is about the glow of our soul from recognising goodness. Of course, we can take joy in the good that we do for others or good in good achievements, but even then, that is about good which stretches beyond ourselves.

What is joy? Joy is like many of these kinds of words, such as hope, peace and love, being a word with complex meanings. We all assume that we know what it means, but if we try to define it, especially in trying to differentiate it from happiness, and then things are often not as easy as they might seem. Joy which in Greek is xαρά [chara] is different from happiness. It's seen as a divine, Spirit-related state linked to God's grace Χάρις [charis]. It's linked to an awareness of God's favour, often flourishing in hardship, because Xápic [charis] holds other meanings including favour, kindness, and a generous gift.

I know that I have shared this video from the Bible Project about the words for joy in the Bible in the past. You may have watched it previously, but I encourage you to watch it again and again. I like to watch these things again because, whilst I know that I have watched them before, I can rarely remember much of what was said in them.

In the story of the Nativity, we have the account of an angel bringing news of great joy to some shepherds in the fields in the region around Bethlehem. Luke 2 tells this story. "...the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, [Christ] the Lord." [Luke 2: 10-11]

For me, as I write this, two things stand out: The angel and the bringing of joy – at least the good news which brings great joy. Angels are messengers of God. ἄγγελος, [ángelos] means "messenger" or "angel" referring to someone who delivers news, often divine. It is the root for our English word "angel," signifying a spiritual being or intermediary between gods/ God and humans, carrying important messages. It was used in ancient Greece for any courier or messenger and later adopted in the Septuagint (Greek Bible) for heavenly messengers, linking it to spirituality, purity, and divine communication. Angels (and they are more complex than the image of a person in a shining white robe with wings) are said to stand in the presence of God and speak the words or Word which God gives them to the person they are also manifesting to.

The reality is that many in life can be joy-less. They might be lacking in joy, or because of their situation or

circumstance, can't see joy which might be available to them. To such people we can be kind of angels. We are people with the presence of God with us. In fact, we are temples of the Holy Spirit [who is God]. [1 Corinthians 6:19] Furthermore, if we are abiding in with God and allow God to abide in us, then we should manifest the Fruit of the presence of God, who is Holy Spirit, some of which is joy. We should be bringers of joy, at least the good news that God is present and at work for good. [Romans 8:28] We can be angel-like and bring joy to others.

Being joy-bringers, and sharers of good news is part of our discipleship and should be a focus in our everyday-liturgical work during Advent, and not just in the third week. How we can be more angelic in our joy-bringing is certainly something to think about.



How doing little things makes a big difference.

Topic: Banning Gambling Advertising

A total ban on gambling advertising would pass parliament with a conscience vote, according to a Labor MP Mike Freelander, who is in favour of tackling the issue as a matter of public health. Liberal Simon Kennedy and independent Kate Chaney are also in agreement and are the co-chairs of the newly revived Parliamentary <u>Friends of Gambling Harm Minimisation</u> group. Ms Chaney said there was "broad support" across the political spectrum for "serious reform of the predatory online gambling industry".

There is also a growing movement to tighten up other gambling legislation. Alliance for Gambling Reform chief executive Martin Thomas said the current system had allowed the Northern Territory to act as a "regulatory haven" for foreign-owned bookmakers with "low tax, light oversight and quick approvals". "A single NT licence allows foreign companies to operate nationwide, bypassing stronger regulatory regimes that in places in other states," he said.

A national survey reveals that around three million Australians are engaged in some form of harmful gambling, which is linked to financial stress, family violence and poor mental health. About 1 per cent of online bettors generate more than 40 per cent of all losses, according to research collated for the Alliance. High-loss gamblers are predominantly employed men aged 25 to 44, including many with children and mortgages, as well as people in financial stress or with mental health vulnerabilities.

What can I do?

Pray for an end to all gambling advertising in Australia on all forms of media and legislation to put stronger controls on multinational gambling corporations.

Email your federal representative and NSW Senators. Explain to them why it is so important to ban all gambling advertising and that a partial ban will not work. Parliament sessions have finished for 2025. It is expected that the first week of parliament for 2026 will be in the first week in February. Contacting them from mid-January might be the most effective strategy.
