Ways of Salvation

How does God save us? This area of theology is called soteriology because the Greek word for save is σώζω (sōzō) and the noun for salvation is σωτηρία (sōtēria). σώζω (sōzō), which frequently appears in the New Testament means saving, healing, rescuing, or making whole. It implies complete restoration—body, soul, and spirit—rather than just spiritual salvation. Yet, it is often used interchangeably with healing sickness or delivering from danger. The important think is that we are saved by God from sin and death. [Romans 8:1-2] Knowing how we are saved is helpful though as it helps us to understand and speak rightly of God.

There are different understandings of how God saves us. This is something that I have spoken and written about before. At Easter with many Biblical passages often mentioning how Jesus saves us through his death and resurrection it is good to just explore them a little.

The main way many of us have been taught about God's salvation as Christ is that Jesus died in our place to save us from the punish-

ment God rightly should give us. This is called Penal Substitution Atonement. There are good Scriptural grounds for Penal Substitution Atonement theory or soteriology. One is example is 2 Corinthians 5: 21 which states, "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

However, there is also wriggle room in how we interpret such passages in the light of God's continuing revelation. Just as we see Christ transforming people's understanding of God and God's ways and the disciples not always getting it, it is reasonable to expect that Paul who was not present for all of Jesus's teaching might take his own slant. In saying that even if penal Substitution is a theory of atonement, there are others as well which sit alongside. I personally and passionately go back to Christ who is the Word of God as the baseline for my hermeneutics of salvation. I think Jesus trumps Paul or any other epistler, as important as they may be.

Having said that, we can interpret Jesus as being made sin. Jesus was made sin. The Greek word is Ποιέω (poieō) is a Koine/Ancient Greek verb meaning "to do" or "to make," frequently used in the New Testament to describe acting, creating, producing, or establishing something. It has a broad range of applications, often implying effort or producing a result, and is the root of the English words "poet" and "poem".

Ways of salvation-cont'd

To make Jesus sin is a hard and strange concept to get our thinking around. Why would God make Jesus to be sin? As Paul writes, Jesus was without sin. One interpretation of this is that Jesus is the offence and affront of God to the way the world. God sinned against the way of the world, which in reverse is that the way of the world is the sin against God. Thus, Jesus becomes the atoning sacrifice for God's failure to comply to the will of the world and us who comprise it. Jesus incurs the wrath of humanity and is made sin by those whom he was seen to be blasphemy. Jesus was offered by God as a sin offering to a world who saw the Kingdom of God as an affront and offence. Jesus is the atoning sacrifice which opens the hearts of humans to reconciliation with God.

At a personal level there are many of us who have a complaint against God. How can God judge humanity, being divine and without any experience of what it is like to struggle as a mortal. Jesus is the atoning sacrifice in this case. Jesus is the lived compassion of God who feels with us, because as Jesus God was human. Then there are those who are upset and angry at God who is supposed to be good, but who allows us or those we love to suffer and even die. In our deepest anger we can even want God to pay and suffer like we have. Here again, Jesus is the atoning sacrifice to appease our anger and wrath.

Of course, it is just ok to allow that Paul uses penal Substitution as a theological metaphor alongside others such as scapegoating etc. Penal Substitution is one piece of the puzzle of how we understand the salvation of God. It

is there as part of our theological heritage, and for many it is the main way that they understand the salvation of God. It is good in describing the love and grace of God, but fails to speak well of justice and rightness nor of the sovereignty of God. And so, like any metaphor it will fall short in area and not be a full image of the purer idea. Thus, we can accept it as a piece of the puzzle and bring in to bear other images and theologies/theories of atonement with which we build a fuller picture the grace, love, mercy, forgiveness, salvation and redemption that God offers and works for.

How are we saved? We are saved through the grace and love of God. How that works and how we understand God through it is called Soteriology. It is ultimately by faith that we are saved. It is through believing in God, whom we know through Jesus and how much God loves us and what that means for our living that we enter into eternal life. Yet, it is good to think about how we understand our salvation and what more we can learn from the thinking and experience of others who might hold a different idea, doctrine or teaching. Thus, Soteriology and how we are saved is something good to think about.

How doing little things makes a big difference.

Topic: Uniting World Update

UnitingWorld is the international aid and partnerships agency of the Uniting Church in Australia. They partner with the global church to address the causes and consequences of poverty, injustice and violence. Below is the recent Uniting World media release: 'Australia Holds the Line On Aid'.

'Right now, humanitarians the world over are operating with far less support. A global retreat from foreign aid is happening at precisely the wrong moment. Early last year, the United States closed USAID and slashed its foreign aid budget by more than 80 percent. Modelling from Boston University suggests this has already caused 600,000 deaths, two-thirds of them children. Other major funders followed: Germany cut aid by 50%, the UK by 40% and France by 37%, all diverted to record defence spending.

We are thankful that Australia's aid budget was saved from cuts, in no small part by a movement of faithful Christians and church institutions refusing to see aid as discretionary spending, but as an extension of our shared values.

If you added your voice through the 'Safer World For All' campaign, contacted your Member of Parliament, or prayed for and supported us and our partners as they advocated in Canberra – thank you! There's still a long way to go. Australia's foreign aid remains at a historic low of just 0.5 per cent of the federal budget, well below what's needed to meet humanitarian and development needs around the world.

We will continue to urge the government to restore Australian aid to the modest level of 1% of the Federal Budget, a small step that would have a huge impact.'
